

Growing up and learning about history in school was never my favorite subject. As a child I had an, 'uninterested mind' when it came to things of the past. Come May 30th, at the 7 p.m. vigil mass of anticipation, we will be operating at 25% capacity. St. Mary's can comfortably hold 450+ something. We have over 3k square feet at St. Mary's and we're going to use every square inch. With that being said, we're shooting for 100-110 people per mass. This won't be much different then any normal weekend masses. Saturday

This won't be much different then any normal wovigil mass houses anywhere from 60-100 people, the 9 a.m. houses 120-150 people, and the 1 p.m. holds around 50-80, depending on the time of the year. With that being said, we're in good shape. We will have signs posted to where we can enter and exit, ushers will be around to help 'usher' for people who are uncertain; and we will have a very safe and orderly way about cleaning and sanitizing our interior. St. Mary's will have some mass parts streamlined and simplified. I will give more info and details come Pentecost weekend. Until then just be assured that we're OPENING SOON!
