

Within the Word

For, Jews, the Temple represented the location and the absolute presence of God. It was and still the most revered and most sacred place for the children of Israel. Jesus declares that a new Temple will be found in his own resurrected body. This is a stark contrast to Jewish thinking. See, Instead of God's presence being confined to a single geographical site, Jesus is offering His body, the true temple for the whole world. So that God would be everywhere, making all things throughout all time, potentially sacred.

Also, remember this Lent, that 'we are the temple of God in the world', says St. Paul. One could ask themselves, "have I really grasped this meaning of the Body of Christ? Or the reality that I am a living temple of Christ Jesus, in which the Word of God is eternally spoken? Yes...you are!

Strange as it seems, commerce was necessary to sustain the cultural worship of God, (ancient times) in his temple. Animals had to be sold for sacrifice, and Roman money was changed into Jewish money to pay for the temple tax. As human beings we tend to usually, ask for forgiveness first, then permission. Where then should this exchange take place? It's fair to say, not within the temple area! Jesus is angry as He sees the lack of respect the people have for His Father's house, the place of prayer, the place of Presence. The people are blind to who Jesus is, and deaf to His message. Jesus is also upset, because His father's house was being turned into a wall street shady marketplace. (like Hedge Fund shady)

I always wonder...did Jesus express his anger appropriately? I think He did, and as the Son of God, it was more than reasonable...Really for anyone for that matter, what would it say about Jesus if He did nothing? I would be upset too if someone desecrated something of my Family, whether my families make shift chapel or one of our grave plots. Yes, when it comes to thinking quick to drive out the evil in life, we sometimes have to bring out the old whip and pray. I like to think of the rosary as our modern-day whip to chase evil out of our lives...

Another question I remind myself, 'What am I doing, or are doing that might seem to be irreverent, or not appropriate in our places of worship today? Lastly, John's gospel frequently plays on the double-meaning of words. It's his style. Here, in the dialogue between Jesus and the Jews, there is a breakdown in communication. The Jews understand "temple" to apply only to the building in which they are standing. Jesus, however, is applying the term to his own body and is prophesying his resurrection. This was to be the sign about which they had been asking.



Lenten Q&A: Why don't we say "Alleluia" during Lent?

The point of the season is a kind of exile. While the event of the Resurrection has occurred in history, the days of Lent serve as a reminder that we do not yet experience the Kingdom in its fullness. We live in the hope of the Resurrection, but the weakness of human existence is all too evident in this life. The omission of the alleluia is one symbolic way to enter into the spirit of the season of Lent. The days of Lent are days of penance and recollection of human weakness but also days of anticipation and so we long for the day when the Kingdom is fully realized. To be deprived of certain things during the days of Lent is designed to create a longing for the realization of all that the life of Jesus promises.


