

A message from Fr. Cryton,

The world is in need of Good Samaritans

We are in the fifteenth week of the ordinary time. The Gospel today speaks of the parable of the Good Samaritan. We are called through today's liturgy to imitate some 'Good Samaritan attitudes' to make our surroundings with more care and concern.

Meg Bucher comes out with a few lessons that we learn from this parable.

Be Observant: We live in a fast-paced world where it is easy to overlook the needs of others. But if we learn from this parable, we will be careful to be aware of those who are around us. We can take notice of the people God places in our lives, both those who encourage and help us and those who need our help and encouragement. The neighbour we're called to love is often not the one we choose but one God chooses for us.

Prayerfully Prepare for these Moments: "Do not withhold good from those to whom it is due, when it is in your power to act. Do not say to your neighbor, Come back tomorrow and I'll give it to you-when you already have it with you." (*Proverbs 3:27-28*). A disciplined life of prayer will allow to see people from God's perspective and fight any fear holding us back from taking immediate action. When we pray for eyes open to see people in need, God is faithful to reveal them. It's only humanly possible to help someone to a certain extent, so we need to cut God into the moment through prayer.

Don't Hesitate: We have received the spirit of God through our Baptism and have been confirmed through Confirmation. This affects the way we see those around us. Instead of weighing our options and wondering if we have time to stop and help, trust God to stretch minutes when we are convicted to help. The Samaritan man wasn't prepared with a medical kit in case he crossed paths with someone who needed bandaging. Unless we are willing to get involved in the lives of others, we are only blowing smoke. Love is something we do.

Be Generous: "It is a sin to despise one's neighbor, but blessed is the one who is kind to the needy." (*Proverbs 14:21*). Christians are called to live generous lives, both in meeting the physical needs of others and in our outpouring of compassion for our neighbors. The Samaritan man gave what he had. We are all too often led by a cynical mindset of short supply. However, God promises the more we share the more we have.

At times Love is so costly. When the Samaritan tended to the victim's wounds, he gave of his own resources. One of the most valuable resources we have is our time. Loving his neighbor not only cost the Samaritan at least two days' wages, but also his time.

God has given us resources so that we can be a blessing to others.


