A message from Fr. Cryton,

October – The Month of the Rosary

We are in the 27th week of the ordinary time. We also begin a new month. A month with some specialty. We all know that the month of October is dedicated to Our Lady of Rosary. Let me share some thoughts on this topic for this weekend.

Why Month of October? One of the main reasons is October 7 every year is the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary. This feast was introduced in 1571 by Pope Saint Pius V (1504-1572) in honor and gratitude of the Blessed Virgin Mary for her intercession resulting in the miraculous victory of the Christian forces on October 7, 1571 in the famous Battle of Lepanto. The Pope strongly believed that it was more of the power of prayer of the rosary than of the weapons and valor of the soldiers.

History of Rosary: As per Fr. Roger Lumbre, the monks during the early times have already started praying by reading the 150 psalms, which is also develop into the liturgy of the hours. But most people by then could not read and write, much less they did not possess the bible or at least the book of psalms. In place of the psalms people started to pray the Hail Mary substituting the 150 Psalms. Being a shortened simplified breviary, even today it is still called Mary's Psalter! It was believed that this devotion was spread by the Dominicans, after Mary's apparition to St. Dominic in 1206.

Life Lesson: While the Rosary is primarily a method of prayer that brings us closer to God, it can also be called a "preacher," teaching us virtues to imitate. According to Philip Kosloski, rosary leads man to the knowledge of the life of Christ, and then to the following of His ways, the practice of His virtues, the imitation of His life among men. Not only does it teach us virtue through the meditation on the life of Jesus Christ, but also through the life of the Virgin Mary, The Rosary reveals to us, for our encouragement, Mary as the pattern of all virtues.

Humility: Humility is the foundation of our spiritual building, The Incarnation is the mystery of deepest humility, the Highest becomes the Lowest, the Greatest the Least. In the Sorrowful mysteries it is all humility-from the Garden to the Mountain, one prolonged, unbroken act of deepest humility and humiliation. Even in the triumphs, commemorated in the Glorious decades, we meditate upon the exaltation of the Humble. Mary, too, is revealed to us throughout as the humble "handmaid of the Lord. "

Obedience: A virtue that is often difficult for us to learn is obedience, and it too is featured throughout the Rosary. "That I should do your will, O my God." "Not My will, but yours be done" was the motto of the divine life on earth.

Detachment: Another difficult virtue that is highlighted throughout the Rosary. "Blessed are the poor in spirit," Jesus said, but before He preached it by word, He preached it by example of life. The stable, the poor mother, the working-man as foster father, the poor cottage, the disciples who were men of the people, the nakedness on the Cross, the burial in a borrowed grave. All these shows his detachment in this world.

"Do you Know" By Deacon Tom What Are Signal Graces?

Grace is the indwelling of God moving the soul. Signal graces are extraordinary graces that move the soul by the intellect and will in such a way that the reception of the grace — to a certain degree — can even be detected by others — or less commonly, even in ourselves.

Put in another way, Signal Graces are signs sent by God to help us make the right decisions in life. Moses saw a burning bush as a sign from God, and other people received signs from God daily. Signal graces usually come about as subtle hints to help keep us moving in the right direction – these signs are truly gifts from God.

Our Lady promised Signal Graces in The second of the fifteen promises of the Blessed Virgin Mary to Catholics who pray the Rosary daily.

Remember – there is no such thing as a coincidence, everything happens for a reason! By praying the rosary you will be more conscious of the way that God tries to help you and speak to you every day.

A lot of times, God grants signal graces when He desires not just the conversion of a soul, but a conversion that will take the soul to a whole different level of faithfulness, preparing them for the person's new phase in life. The best examples of these are in "conversions" that are very noticeable and abruptly life changing. The conversions of saints like St. Augustine of Hippo and St. Mary Magdalene are great examples of persons who have received signal graces. They received extraordinary graces that changed their hearts and minds to such a degree that they changed their lives entirely to live only for Jesus Christ. See you in Church! Deacon Tom!
