

A Message from Fr. Cryton

The significance of All Saints, All Souls Days & Modern Halloween Celebration

In couple of days, we will be entering into month of November. The month we start remembering the triumphant Church (All saints day) and all souls day back-to-back. Let's reflect today the significance of these days and the modern Halloween celebrations.

All Saints and All Souls comprise the two-day celebration of the Communion of Saints - those who are with God in heaven and those who are on their way to heaven. On the Solemnity of All Saints, November 1, the Church celebrates those Christians who achieved spiritual maturity. A day later, on the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed (All Souls' Day), the Church remembers and prays for the faithful departed: our brothers and sisters who have died marked with the sign of faith. Particularly, we pray for all the souls in purgatory.

All saints Day celebration began most likely as All Martyrs' Day, can be traced to the earliest Christians. By the third century, the followers of Christ were annually honoring their brothers and sisters who had given their lives (been martyred) while witnessing for and defending Jesus Christ. Tombs were sometimes decorated and altars built over the tomb. As per Henry Chadwick, from the third century the anniversary of a martyr's death, called his Birthday.

Greg Garrison explains, everybody knows the celebration of Halloween. But not everybody knows it derives from a holy day. The root word of Halloween - "hallow" means "holy." The suffix "een" is an abbreviation of "evening." It refers to the Eve of All Hallows, the night before the Christian holy day that honors saintly people of the past.

He further explains, more than a thousand years ago in Ireland and Britain, a common custom of Christians was to come together on the eve of the feast of All Hallows Day to ask for God's blessing and protection from evil in the world. Often, they would dress in costumes of saints or evil spirits and act out the battle between good and evil around bonfires. That's the source of the modern observance of Halloween.

As we remember the faithful departed during the month of November, let's remember these words, "The souls of the just are in the hand of God, and no torment shall touch them. They seemed, in the view of the foolish, to be dead; and their passing away was thought an affliction and their going forth from us, utter destruction. But they are in peace." (Book of Wisdom)

"Do you Know" By Deacon Tom All Saints All Souls

The twin celebrations of All Saints (November 1) and All Souls (November 2) remind us that, as the order of Christian Funerals puts it, "death is no the end nor does it break the bonds forged in life,"

As early as the 4th century, Christians commemorated the lives of the martyrs, whose deaths paralleled Christ's death on the cross. Over time, non martyrs who had lived lives of particular virtue also came to be venerated and invoked in public prayer.

Catholic devotion to saints is different from the adoration we give to God alone. We ask the help of the saints, just as we might ask the prayers of our fellow parishioners today. According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, the saints' "intercession is their most exalted service to God's plan. We can and should ask them to intercede for us and for the whole world" (#2683).

In the same way, we pray for those who have died but have yet to enter fully into the joys of heaven. The Church teaches that a time of purgatory is necessary to remove the effects of sin so we can be fully united with God.
