

TRANSFORMATION THROUGH SACRAMENTS

On the SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT each year, we have the Gospel account of the Transfiguration of Jesus. This transfiguration of Jesus is like a wakeup call for the three apostles and for us. I read this very beautiful reflection about Jesus' transfiguration in relationship to the seven sacraments from the homily of a priest. According to him that transfiguration or transformation can occur to us through the sacraments too:

First is the Sacrament of Initiation:

Sacrament of Baptism is the very beginning of our transformation. As we become members of the Christian community, we are anointed Priest, Prophet and King. Through Baptism, we mysteriously and miraculously put on Christ and we become "Christ Like."

The Sacrament of Confirmation transforms us and calls us to renew our Baptismal promise. Confirmation instills in us the power of the Holy Spirit. Confirmation strengthens us to defend the message of the Gospel. The Gifts of the Holy Spirit – Wisdom, Understanding, Counsel, Fortitude, Knowledge, Piety and Fear of the Lord – give us the tools to spread the message of Jesus.

The Sacrament of Holy Communion or Eucharist, we are transformed and refreshed. When we receive Jesus in the Eucharist, we are refreshed in the likeness of Christ. Eucharist enables us to take what we hear in the Gospel and carry that message out into the world, to the people we work with, to the people we meet in day today life, and especially to the people we live with.

Second is the Sacrament of Healing:

The Sacrament of Penance or Reconciliation transforms us from a state of sin to a state of holiness with Christ.

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick transforms us and strengthens us when we are ill. The Sacrament gives us grace. It gives us peace and courage to overcome the difficulties that may go with serious illness or the frailty of old age. This grace is a gift of the Holy Spirit, renewing our trust in God and strengthening us against the temptations of evil. *Third is the Sacrament of Commitment:*

The Sacrament of Ordination transforms a man from laity into the Order of Deacon, Priest or Bishop. Through Ordination an ordinary man becomes extraordinary. Ordination enables a Priest to celebrate the Eucharist. The priest is given the extraordinary power to forgive sins. The priest is given the extraordinary power to change bread and wine into the body and blood of Jesus Christ. Through Ordination this ordinary man is transformed and takes on the powers of Christ in our midst.

The Sacrament of Matrimony transforms two totally individual people into a union of one. Matrimony is not only a union of man and wife, but it is more importantly a union of the couple with Almighty God. Matrimony is a triune relationship. It transforms a man and a woman with God as the center of a holy and a sacramental relationship. The Sacrament of Marriage can infuse grace into the lives of the couple daily.

Most of the time when we receive the sacraments and the grace that accompanies them, we are unaware of that transforming power of the sacraments. Transfiguration means beyond figuration or physical appearance. In other words, transfiguration happens within our hearts and minds.

Did You Know/ Tour of the Church

This week we are focusing our attention on the large stained glass window on "Mary's side" of the Church. In this large window we see a young man dressed in a surplice and cassock holding the Child Jesus in his right arm and lilies in his left hand. So who might this be?

Next to the Virgin Mary and St. Joseph the Saint most often holding the Child Jesus is St. Anthony of Padua.


The tradition honors a mystical experience St. Anthony had during his life that was witnessed by a benefactor who gave the Franciscan saint a place to stay for the night. He saw Anthony kneeling, as if in ecstasy, and, full of wonder, admiring and caressing a loving child of rare beauty, who was tenderly embracing the saint. The mystical vision highlights the child-like simplicity of St. Anthony and the purity of his faith. He is known for his profound sermons and his love and care for the poor. His sanctity was so well-known throughout the Church that he was canonized less than one year after his death.

It is a part of tradition in Christian art to use lilies as a symbol of purity. With Saint Anthony lilies have special significance. In 1680, on June 13, (The Feast Day of St. Anthony), in the church at Mentosca d'Agesco in Austria, someone placed a cut lily in the hand of his statue. For an entire year the lily remained fragrant and fully alive, without wilting. Then the following year it grew two more blooms, so that the

church was filled with the fragrance of the flowers.

Much of Christian art depicts St. Anthony in his Franciscan Habit, however it is not uncommon to see St. Anthony in clerical attire (cassock and surplice) for he has been designated as a Doctor of the Church!

Many people pray to St. Anthony when things are lost. I'm just thinking! Not saying you have friends that are lost - but why not invite a friend to church and point out the stained glass window of St. Anthony! **Deacon Tom**


