#### **Lessons from Emmaus Journey**

WE ARE IN THE THIRD WEEK OF EASTER SEASON. The gospel today speaks of the journey of the two disciples to Emmaus and how Jesus appears to them after his resurrection. This journey teaches us a number of lessons for our life. I found this in the web page as I was preparing for my homily. Let me share some of them,

- 1. When we have doubts, we should search the scriptures and pray for understanding: Jesus did not give them some ecstatic experience or some powerful new revelation from heaven, he took them back to the Word of God. The Word stands forever. The Word will remain even when the flower fades and the grass withers. It is the Word of God by which the universe was created (Genesis 1:3) and upon which the universe holds together (Hebrews 1:3; Colossians 1:17). The Word of God is objective, honest and true and it has the answers that we seek. The Word of God shapes our worldview and therefore Jesus took them to the Scriptures and showed them WHY He had to die and WHAT His ministry was truly about
- **2.** We must invite Jesus into our personal lives: They wanted Jesus to stay with them. This is the same attitude that we must have. We ought to be praying for Christ to dwell with us. The Bible says that he acted as if He would go further. They were taught the Scriptures on the road but was that enough or did they want more? Obviously, they wanted more. We must desire more of Him each and every day. They urged Him to stay and He went in to stay with them. Interestingly, the word used for stay is the same word Jesus used when He instructed His disciples in John 15:4 to abide in Him. *This abiding is a long-lasting, fruitful and joyous interaction between God and man!*
- **3.** We must surrender to Jesus: Revelation 3:20 says that Jesus is standing at the door knocking and if ANYONE opens the door, He will come in and dine with them. Dining is an intimate experience. Notice what happens, Jesus comes into their home and He is the one who breaks the bread! It was not customary for the guest to break the bread but in this case, things were a little different! they surrendered their bread to Jesus! We must surrender our bread to Jesus. He can do more with it than we can! We must surrender totally to Him. Let Him into our lives, give Him charge over our bread, the rooms in our homes. We have to show Him the parts of the house that we wouldn't normally show anyone and give Him free reign!
- **4. Do not reject the Holy Spirit's work in preparing our witness:** The Bible says their hearts were burning while Jesus was teaching them. The word for explaining brings to mind a womb being opened or something being cut across. The verb for burning is used in the passive voice. There was someone or something causing the burning while Jesus was teaching. That someone was the Spirit of God! He convicts us, He teaches us and He prepares us. They were now ready because they understood what was happening. We cannot let our fire go down to a flicker! We must stay close to God through prayer and supplication, continually asking for the fire of the Holy Spirit in our hearts. They became witnesses but they had to first be prepared by Jesus!

#### Did You Know/ Tour of the Church

This week we turn our attention to the far back of the church. Up in the choir loft in the center of the church is the stained glass window with the image of a Mitre and two crossed keys.

These keys and Mitre are used as the coat of arms of the church, the coat of arms of the Pope, and the symbolic image in the Holy Land.

The crossed key represents the metaphorical key that Jesus promised to St. Peter, allowing him to take binding action to lead the establishment of the Catholic Church. In short, they are a symbol of papal authority. Jesus said to Peter in the Gospel of Matthew: 16:19 – [Jesus says]: "I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven. Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven."St. Peter was the first pope, and all those who inherited him shared the power that Jesus gave him.

The mitre that we are used to seeing on the heads of the Bishops and the Pope has a shape that resembles a little bellow. It is elongated and bicuspid (i.e. ending with two points). The headdress is composed of two pieces of rigid fabric cut out with a triangular shape and joined partially at the sides, to form two points. These points, called cornua, are not random elements: in fact, they represent the Old and the New Testament.





Anyone wishing to make a report of an allegation of sexual abuse should send that report to Mrs. Teresa Brown, Complaint Intake Agent, at the Diocese of La Crosse, P.O. Box 4004, La Crosse, WI 54602-4004. Alternatively, you can contact Mrs. Brown at 608.791.0179 or <a href="intakeagent@diolc.org">intakeagent@diolc.org</a>. The reporting form is available through the Diocese of La Crosse Office of Safe Environment or on the diocesan website at: diolc.org/safe-environment/ reporting.
