A message from Fr. Cryton

THE ART OF LOVING

The Gospel for the 6th Sunday of Easter emphasizes the union of Jesus with the Father and with believers. Jesus says, "if you love me, obey my commandments". He is teaching us that love is not just a mere word but an action. Eric Fromm, a psychologist, in his book entitled The Art of Loving, lists the following virtues of love which I'm sure is the best way on how to make love concrete and possible.

First, love must have discipline: Discipline means doing something hard because it is right. We are usually not very disciplined people, why? It is because we tend to avoid the difficult, to take the easy way out. We often are not doing what is right because it involves sacrifice. But there can be no real love without sacrifice.

Second, love must have patience: Love is not something that comes abruptly. We have to work at it and let it grow. A person who has patience knows how to wait. A person who has patience reacts not by shouting and angry but by prudence. We have also to be patient with ourselves and with others.

Third, love must be reasonable: It must have an intellectual basis and not based purely on emotion or feeling. It is because feelings change. It must have a practical basis also. Someone said: "Our head is at the top of our heart in order that our feelings must not dominate our reasoning. If we act without thinking, we distort love."

Fourth, love must have humility: The biggest obstacle to love is pride. It is very difficult to say, "I'm sorry!" Let us remember that humility is the foundation of a real love.

Fifth, love must have faith: Faith means that we believe even if we do not have any evidence whatsoever, of our belief. The deadliest enemy of love is lack of trust and faith.

Lastly, love must have courage: In many ways, it is the most important of them all because we have to reach out and touch other people. But how often we do not reach out because we are insecure and because we are afraid of rejection? It takes a lot of courage to love.

"To remain in love with God every day, we must remind ourselves that our most important appointment for the day is our appointment with God, and that our most important agenda is to love". (Fr. Jerry Orbos, SVD)

As we celebrate Mother's Day today, let this be my prayer for all the mothers. MAY THE LORD BLESS YOU AND KEEP YOU, MAY HIS FACE SHINE ON YOU, AND BE GRACIOUS TO YOU, AND GIVE YOU PEACE. (Numbers: 6:24-26). HAPPY MOTHER'S DAY.

SEVEN WAYS TO HONOR MARY IN MAY (Part 2 of 4)

2. REFLECT: Read a book about Mary. Deepen your relationship with her by reading a Marian book as a prayer. While reading, play music and fill your room with beautiful sounds to honor Our Blessed Mother.

3. GARDEN: Take advantage of the fresh air outside and plant a Mary Garden. If you're not familiar with a Mary Garden, it is not difficult to construct. This tradition began centuries ago in Europe where missionaries joined in a collective effort to plant gardens with plants named after Mary. Use a statue of Mary as your focal point and begin planting around it. Consider making a list of your favorite Mary flowers and take the time to learn about their name and meaning. A few floral options for your garden could include:

Marigold: "Mary's gold," which Christians used to offer Mary instead of coins. **Rosemary:** "Mary" is in the name! **Bleeding Heart:** Mary's heart was pierced. **Lily of the Valley:** also known as "Our Lady's Tears." After planting your flowers, choose some selections to add personal meaning, such as painted rocks, pinwheels or stepping stones and watch your garden bloom!
