

A Message from Fr. Cryton,

Humility - Mother of all Virtues

The 14th Sunday in Ordinary time continues to focuses the qualities of discipleship and the believers of Jesus. Among the teachings of Jesus on today' readings, let me share some thoughts on Humility mother of all virtues.

- 1. "Blessed are the poor in spirit; for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are the meek; for they shall inherit the earth.": The very first words of His proclamation of the kingdom of heaven reveal the open gate through which alone we enter. The poor, who have nothing in themselves, to them the kingdom comes. The meek, who seek nothing in themselves, theirs the earth shall be. The blessings of heaven and earth are for the lowly. For the heavenly and the earthly life, humility is the secret of blessing.
- 2. "Learn of Me; for I am meek and humble of heart, and you shall find rest for your souls.": Jesus offers Himself as Teacher. He tells us what the spirit both is, which we shall find in Him as Teacher, and which we can learn and receive from Him. Meekness and lowliness are the one thing He offers us; in it we shall find perfect rest of soul. Humility is to be our salvation.
- 3. "Whosoever shall humble himself as this little child, shall be exalted": Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven? The question is indeed a far-reaching one. What will be the chief distinction in the heavenly kingdom? The answer, none but Jesus would have given. The chief glory of heaven, the true heavenly mindedness, the chief of the graces, is humility.
- 4. "Whoever will be first among you, let him be your servant. Even as the Son of Man came to serve.": Humility, as it is the mark of Christ the heavenly, will be the one standard of glory in heaven: the lowliest is the nearest to God. The primacy in the Church is promised to the humblest.

Fr. Gerald M. Musa expresses how does a humble person look like? He further explains a humble person with the following criteria,

- ❖ Someone who knows himself well
- Someone who acknowledges his strength and accepts his weakness and failures.
- Someone who respects other people.
- Someone who is willing to learn from others. Epicetus the philosopher says, "It is impossible for a person to learn what he thinks he already knows.
- Someone who accommodates the opinion of others, etc.
- Someone who is willing to take corrections and is disposed to receive criticisms.
- Someone who sees something good in others.
- Someone who is a silent donor (helper).

Thank you to all who participated in the ladies sodality banquet! It was a great time with wonderful fellowship! \$275 was collected for the free will donation. After taking out expenses \$161.54 profit will be put in the church door fund.

We have begun again during weekend Masses to offer both species, at holy Communion.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church says that receiving the species of bread alone "has been legitimately established as the most common form in the Latin rite. But the 'sign of communion is more complete when given under both kinds'" (CCC, No. 1390). The U.S. bishops have approval from the Holy See to authorize the distribution of both species at Communion.

The Church has long taught that each species alone contains the body, blood, soul and divinity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, which can never be separated. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal explains that "above all, pastors should instruct the Christian faithful that Christ, whole and entire, and the true Sacrament, is received even under only one species, and consequently that as far as the effects are concerned, those who receive under only one species are not deprived of any of the grace that is necessary for salvation" (No. 282). During holy Communion, whether we receive both species or one species, we receive our Divine Savior whole and undivided.

Did You Know/Tour of the Church By Deacon Tom

As you look at the Main Altar, on the back wall to your left you will see a Statue of Saint Rose of Lima. She is the patron saint of the Philippines, embroiderers, gardeners and South America. Saint Rose may be recognized in church art as a nun with a Crown of thorns or roses and holding a crucifix. Our Statue as you see has a crown of roses on her head, and holding a crucifix.

Her real name was Isabel Flores de Olivia and lived April 20, 1586 - August 24, 1617 in Lima Peru but was named Rose for her beauty. She consecrated herself as a virgin and was known for her piety, charity and mortifications, and was admitted as tertiary to Order of St. Dominic. The meaning of tertiary is third in order; a lay associate of certain Christian monastic organizations. You pronounce tertiary like tur - shee - eh - ree. So she was a Third Order Dominican. Her Feast Day is Aug. 23. Many miracles followed her death: there were stories that she had cured a leper, and that, at the time of her death, the city of Lima smelled like roses; roses also started falling from the sky.


