

A Message from Fr. Cryton,

Four Hearts in the Parable of the Sower

THE 15TH SUNDAY OF THE ORDINARY TIME explains how our hearts need to be ready to receive the word of God and bear much fruit. In today's Gospel, we hear the four different kinds of ground that make us understand as to what kind of hearts we have in listening, living and sharing God's word to others. The following thoughts are derived from a homily of a priest. Name unknown.

Hardened Heart: Jesus says: **"Some seed fell on the path...."** The path is where everyone walks; it is public; It is not a place of interest; it leads to elsewhere. The path has no interiority and is impenetrable. And so therefore, there is no openness at all. We call these people 'shallow'. For them the word of God, the Church and the sacraments are outdated, old-fashioned, irrelevant, unnecessary, unimportant and have nothing to do with their lives.

Distracted Heart: Jesus says: "Some seed fell on rocky ground...." The heart can be like a rock or a stone: solid, impenetrable, self-enclosed, separate, unloving and unloved.... Throughout the ages it has been a common metaphor for the heart. "I will remove the heart of stone from their flesh and give them a heart of flesh" (Ezekiel 11:19). It represents a surface level heart and there is a little openness. For these people, they start enthusiastically but when suffering and difficulties come in their lives, they often depart and give in. They surrender what they have even their own faith in God. There is no real commitment.

Defeated Heart: Jesus says: "Some seed fell among thorns...." It has a chance to grow there, but everything else is growing there too. Our attention is divided into a thousand parts, and only one is available for the word of God. It represents too an insecure heart and there is openness but the heart has many concerns. We also call these people as people with 'selfish heart'. These people are so busy and so preoccupied with material accumulation to the extent that prayers and loving or serving others are forgotten. Going to Mass on Sundays is for them a routine and just an obligation, not because they want to thank God.

Hopeful and Joyful Heart: Jesus says: "Some seed fell on good soil...." It is good soil when none of the above applies. Then the heart is deep, soft and silent. And then we may hear the word of God fully. It represents to a generous and a wide-open heart. They are those people when they hear the word of God and respond into it by applying it to themselves and bear fruits of good deeds.

At the end the question each of us must ask ourselves today is: What type of soil for the word of God do I represent? Am I liking the pathway where the seed cannot even sprout or like the rocky ground where the seed sprouts but has no roots or like thorny ground where the word of God is choked to death by worldly cares or like the good soil that bears much fruit?

Did You Know/Tour of the Church By Deacon Tom

As you look at the main Altar, on the back wall to your right, you will see a statue of Saint Aloysius Gonzaga. In Sacred Art you will see Saint Aloysius Gonzaga as a young man wearing a black cassock and surplice, or as a page. Our statue shows him holding a lily referring to innocence, and a cross referring to piety and sacrifice. You may also see him with a skull referring to his early death, and a rosary referring to his devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

St. Aloysius Gonzaga is the patron saint of youth and students. He was born March 9, 1568 Castiglione delle Stiviere, Republic of Venice Italy and died June 21, 1591 in Rome; canonized in 1726; and his feast day is June 21.


