

A Message from Fr. Cryton,

Weeds among the Wheat

WE ARE IN THE 16TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME. We continue to read another parable, Wheat among the weeds. The summary of this parable is a description of the Kingdom of God. In the parable, a man planted good seed in his field, but his enemy threw weeds on top. The wheat grew and the weeds also grew among the good wheat. The man knew his enemy had planted the weeds but he chose to let the weeds continue to grow because some of the wheat might have been pulled out if they tried to remove the weeds. The farmer intended to separate the good from the bad during the harvest. Colin Smith gives three Applications for our Lord's Story.

1. Stay Engaged: "Let both grow together." (Matthew 13:30)

Where has God rooted you down? Where have you been sown? Stay engaged!

Don't be on an agenda of withdrawal from the world. There are no ideal spots in this world. Wherever Christ sows his people Satan sows his weeds. So, bloom where you are planted.

Augustine said: "Those who are weeds today may be wheat tomorrow."

2. Practice Tolerance: "Let both grow together." (Matthew 13:30)

The word tolerance had been hijacked in our culture. It used to mean showing patience and forbearance towards people with whom you radically disagree. Now it is used to mean affirming what others affirm. But there is no need for tolerance between people who affirm the same convictions. If you agree what is there to tolerate?

Tolerance is a wonderful Christian virtue that is needed where there are deep-seated disagreements. It means showing patience and forbearance towards people you find really difficult, and with whom you radically disagree.

It does not mean passivity. It does not mean that you give up concern for another person's spiritual condition. Jesus makes it clear that in this world, the wheat needs to grow alongside the weeds until the Son of Man comes.

Always remember, the mission of the church is sowing seeds not pulling weeds. We have a big enough challenge on our hands trying to deal with sin in our own hearts, our own families, and our own churches. It is not in our power or in our calling to root it out in the world. That is the work of Christ and he will do it when he comes.

3. Anticipate the Harvest: Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. (Matthew 13:43)


God will harvest the wheat. He will bring His people home, and the righteous will shine like the sun. With whom will you be bundled on that day?

May you be found in the bundle of life with the people of God who submit their lives to King Jesus and stand before the Father in the grace that they find in Him.

At the time of our eternal judgment, our inner being will become known and the goodness of believers will shine forth as bright light. May we use our time on Earth to pursue God's will and pray that we find ourselves welcome into His Holy Kingdom when that time comes.


Marriage: One Flesh, Given and Received Supporting God's gifts of love and life in marriage

Did You Know/Tour of the Church By Deacon Tom

In the middle of the back Altar is a large statue of The Sacred Heart of Jesus. The Sacred Heart of Jesus is brought to the forefront twice each liturgical year, first on the feast of the Sacred heart which is celebrated on the third Friday after Pentecost, and again on October 16, the memorial of St. Margaret Mary Alacogue, one of the foremost saints to promote devotion to the Sacred Heart. When you look at our Statue you see Jesus' right hand opening up in the gesture of welcoming all to come. His left hand is pointing to his heart which is outside his body, representing Jesus' deep love and affection for us. Jesus is wearing a red tunic which symbolizes fervent love and that he laid down his life for us, which is also seen in the wounds of the crucifixion in his hands. To get a better image of the Sacred Heart look at the stained glass window closest to the statue of St. Joseph.


