



A message from Fr. Cryton,

The Biblical attributes of true leadership

The 31st Sunday of the ordinary time is an invitation to ponder what type of leaders we are in the modern world. We are called to be faithful and good shepherds through our baptism. Let us learn some attributes of a biblical leader explained by Barry. As per Barry, when leading others, following Biblical principles is perhaps the most important thing a leader should aspire to.

- 1. An effective leader must be a Visionary: The Bible says in Proverbs 29:18, "Where there is no vision, the people perish." A leader must look to God for the vision or goal He wants them to achieve. Without a vision or a goal to works towards, the leader is not likely to achieve anything significant for the Kingdom.
- **2.** An effective leader must be Passionate: As a leader you must care deeply about your ministry and be committed to it. Your passion for the ministry will encourage others and enable you to succeed when obstacles arise. And when these times occur, the only thing that will get you through them, besides the Lord, is your passion. (Proverbs 16:3)
- **3.** An effective leader must be Spirit-led: The effective leader knows that ministry is a partnership between the leader and God. God gives us our part to do and then He does His part. But we can never work alone or trust in our own power or abilities.
- **4.** An effective leader must be a Servant: As our Lord and Savior "did not come to be served, but to serve" (Matthew 20:28), we too must serve and not be served. This runs contrary to what the world teaches leaders to be. So, a leader is called to serve his followers and not be served by them. Consequently, a servant leader helps his followers grow & succeed.
- **5.** An effective leader must be Focused: A leader often has many responsibilities and duties to carry out in their position. It is critical for a leader to avoid being distracted by issues unrelated to their vision and mission. When your vision and mission are clear it is easier to stay focused on the goals God wants you to accomplish for the Kingdom.
- **6.** An effective leader must be Prepared: A leader must expect the unexpected and be prepared to lead, manage or minister as needed in any given situation. Preparation takes sacrifice and planning ahead. Virtually all successful leaders have had a major crisis that required their leadership, and being prepared for that situation is what allowed them to be successful. (2 Timothy 4:2)
- **7.** An effective leader must be Opportunistic: Successful leaders are those leaders who are able to navigate through difficult times as well as take advantage of new opportunities. Leaders should take advantage of the opportunities God gives them today and not just plan for the future or stay stuck in the past. In order to do that a leader must be prepared and alert for those opportunities. Success happens where opportunity meets preparation. (1 Peter 3:15)



Did You Know/Tour of the Church By Deacon Tom

The handheld bells got their name for they were rung during the Holy, Holy. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM No. 150) says: A little before the consecration, if appropriate, a minister rings a small bell as a signal to the faithful. The minister also rings the small bell at each elevation by the priest, according to local custom. I other words, the bells are rung during the epiclesis (when the priest calls upon the Holy Spirit to come down and make theses gifts holy), then during the elevation of the host and precious blood during consecration. Ringing techniques can vary as well. In some cases, the bells are rung for three short bursts at both of the elevations/presentations. These three short bursts are said to represent the three persons of the Holy Trinity. If executed well this triple ringing can sound quite solemn, but a single ringing of the bells at each specified point in the Mass is executed in accordance with the General Instruction of the Roman Missal.



In the thirteenth century that outdoor tower bells began to be rung as "Sanctus bells" during the Mass. Ringing the bells also gave notice to those unable to attend the Mass (the sick, slaves, outside guards, etc.) that something divine and miraculous was taking place inside of the church building. The voice of the bell would allow people to stop what they were doing to offer an act of adoration to God. Additionally, the bells helped to focus the attention of the faithful inside the church on the miracle that was taking place on the altar of sacrifice.


