A Message from Fr. Cryton,

Season of Advent & Need of Spiritual Preparation

The Season of Advent: not material, but spiritual preparation; not external but internal preparation. Hence, on this second Sunday, the liturgy presents to us the main figure of Advent, St. John the Baptist. He is the voice crying in the desert: "Prepare the way of the Lord!" And the preparation he refers to is internal and spiritual. Based on the readings this Sunday, the essence of preparation is to make us get ready for the coming of the Lord. Physical and mental preparations can only take us so far. Spiritual preparation is the ultimate form of preparation; for this reason, St. Paul says: "Live in the spirit and do not gratify the desires of the flesh" (Gal. 5:16). Let me share some thoughts from Fr. Bonnie, on spiritual preparation for the season of advent from the first reading today from prophet Isiah.

The Prophecy of Isaiah gives us, three dependable ways to undertake spiritual preparation:

(1) Filling the valleys: A valley is a low land between two high lands. Spiritually it shows that something is lacking. Spiritual preparation here entails bringing back the values that we have lost in our lives. These include but are not restricted to our lack of faith, hope, trust, patience, and ultimately our lack of love for God and others.

(II) Levelling the mountains and hills: Mountains and hills are elevated landscapes. In this context, they appear to be obstacles. Leveling the mountains and hills entails removing the obstacles on our spiritual terrains. They include but are not reduced to an excessive attachment to material things or worldliness and defective mindsets.

(III) Smoothening the rugged plain: Something is rugged when it ceases to be straight. The two essential things our need to make straight are our relationship with God and others and our prayer life.

It is a fitting theme as we have organized the sacrament of Reconciliation this Wednesday in our parish. The sacrament of reconciliation embodies the Advent spirit of preparation, reflection, and renewal.



Let's take a look at the meaning of the Advent Wreath and Candles! (Part 2 of 4)

Traditionally, the Advent wreath is a circle of evergreen branches. It is often decorated with berries and pinecones. Both the evergreen branches and the circular shape symbolize the passing of time and eternal life. The shape of the wreath, with no beginning or end, reflects the complete and endless love that Jesus has for us. The Advent wreath holds the four Advent candles. The candles represent Jesus coming as the light in darkness. One candle is lit each Sunday until all four candles are lit. As Christmas draws nearer, each candle brings a little more light into the dark-

ness. Sometimes a white candle is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day to symbolize that Jesus is with us. This can be referred to as the "Christ candle."

The second week's candle is called the Bethlehem Candle and represents **peace and preparation.** During this second week of Advent, we reflect on our lives and work on becoming better-versions-of-ourselves in preparation for Jesus' coming. We remember the journey Joseph and Mary took from Nazareth to Bethlehem.
