A Message from Fr. Cryton

Role of Mary at Christmas

Among the many characters in Christmas scene, Mary plays a vital role. Mary's unreserved and uncompromising "YES" (Fiat) in her conversation with the angel Gabriel became fruitful through the following gestures explained by Fr. Gerald Mauka. Let these gestures be the tools and lessons for us to celebrate Christmas meaningfully.

(1) MARY LISTENS AND PRAYS: God, as of the days of Adam and Eve in the garden of Eden (Gen 3:8), still speaks to us every second and every minute in various ways, but oftentimes, we might form too busy to pay attention and hear God speak to us. Paul VI says of silence," Of all human activities, man's listening to God is the Supreme act of his reasoning and will." "Silence is the beginning of prayer", says Mother Teresa. So, this great virtue of listening took place at prayer. We live in a noisy neighborhood that is too busy to listen to the promptings of the conscience; and more still, too busy to listen to one another, especially, the aged, the sick, those troubled by anxiety and worries-just give them some time.

May we learn from Mary today, how to prayerfully listen to God and our environment.

(2) MARY BELIEVES: The unflinching faith of Mary was outstanding in consolidating her key role in the work of Salvation. She had great convictions that the righteous cannot please God with unbelief (Heb 11:6). She was humble in faith that she first believes and only then reasons upon that to which she had already acceded to, "Let it be done to me according to your word" Even her kinswoman, Elizabeth's conception, "Know that Elizabeth your kinswoman has conceived a son in her old age; she who was thought to be sterile is now in her sixth month, for nothing is impossible with God," (vv. 36-37, was accorded a great "YES" (Fiat) gesture, despite Elizabeth's slim and impossible state of conceiving at old ago.

Mary's faith is ever active and hence she does not only accept the divine truth but dwell upon it, use it and develop it. Her faith is ever active and hence she says, "I am the handmaid of the Lord


(3) MARY OBEYS: "Obedience is better than sacrifice" (1Sam 15:22), was perfectly actualized in the life of Mary. For St Augustine, "Obedience is in a way the mother of all virtues." Mary's obedience is risk-taking when she says, "Let it be done to me according to your word," (v. 38). Her obedience is loving. She loves God and hence trusts in Him and obeys. She kept on saying, 'YES' to God, even when it pains until the end of her earthly life to be the Mother of God. Our God loves and values obedience, that is why Mary's Fiat was rewarded with "overshadowing" of the Holy Spirit, whereas, Adams's and Saul's disobedience brought departure of God's presence in their lives (Ge. 3:6; 1 Sam 16:14)

Our divine Master knows what is best for us, and obey his commands, and in due time m we will know and understand. Mary understood this and obeyed God in all humility with her unequivocal "YES."

Let's take a look at the meaning of the Advent Wreath and Candles! (Part 4 of 4)

Traditionally, the Advent wreath is a circle of evergreen branches. It is often decorated with berries and pinecones. Both the evergreen branches and the circular shape symbolize the passing of time and eternal life. The shape of the wreath, with no beginning or end, reflects the complete and endless love that Jesus has for us. The Advent wreath holds the four Advent candles. The candles represent Jesus coming as the light in darkness. One candle is lit each Sunday until all four candles are lit. As Christmas draws nearer, each can-

dle brings a little more light into the darkness. Sometimes a white candle is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day to symbolize that Jesus is with us. This can be referred to as the "Christ candle."

The third week's candle is called the "Angel's Candle" and represents Love.

During this final week of Advent we rejoice in the endless love that God has for us, which is made apparent in the birth of his Son. We reflect on the good news of God's love brought to us from the angel Gabriel.
