

A Message from Fr. Cryton,

The seed of Kingdom of God

WE ARE IN THE ELEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME. The Gospel today has two parables: The Seed growing by itself and Mustard Seed. These parables point to what Kingdom of God is becoming. In other words, how God's kingdom will grow. Let us reflect on three lessons we come across through these parables. This reflection is taken from a homily of a priest.

FIRST, JESUS TELLS TO HOPE: There are occasions when our faith is put into test. It seems that our faith is useless, because like for example, our words seem to have no effect on our children and the gap is even growing. As teachers we do not notice any change in our students' attitudes notwithstanding all our efforts and personal example. Everything appears to go wrong in our work and nobody cares. In the organization we joined, we look maybe in vain for true brotherhood or sisterhood. The parable tells us to hope. The kind words that we tell today and fail to penetrate in one's being might bear only its fruit tomorrow. The effort we seemingly waste on our children or students will one day become an inspiration to them as adults. Let us keep on hoping.

SECOND, JESUS TELLS US TO BE PATIENT: Maybe, first of all, let us be patient with ourselves, for we are the first to suffer from our shortcomings like being over-sensitive, being a worrier or perfectionist. We may have to plant the seed of understanding to convince ourselves that very few people want to be bad, but that all people make mistakes. We need to believe that increasing our love for the person who lacks love for us is the most convincing way to come to terms. Think first before you lose your patience with someone you love. We forget that forgiveness is greater than revenge. People make mistakes. But the actions we take while in a rage will haunt us forever.

THIRD, JESUS TELLS US TO TRUST GOD: God planted the seed of His Kingdom inside us. He understands what is happening in our heart even if we don't, so we should trust. Trust is a very important factor for all relationships. When trust is broken, it is the end of the relationship. Lack of trust leads to suspicion, suspicion generates anger, anger causes enmity and enmity may result in separation.

We must always hope, be patient and trust God. If we do these, things will work out in God's own time and in His own way. God planted the seed of His Kingdom in our hearts when we were baptized. Our duty is to hopefully nurture it, trustfully and patiently, by praying the word of God and by praying and receiving the sacraments.

Change to Stipends effective July 1st, 2024

For 30 years the suggested donations for Masses, funerals, and marriages has remained the same throughout the dioceses of Wisconsin. The Bishops of Wisconsin gathered recently and decreed that stipends should be adjusted to reflect the current time and to account for inflation.

The new suggested stipends are as follows:

Mass Stipends: \$20 Funerals: \$75 Marriages: \$100 Quinceaneras: \$100

These new suggested amounts take effect with events that take place on or after July 1, 2024. They do not apply retroactively to those who have already paid the appropriate amount for an upcoming event (even one that takes place after July 1, 2024) The new suggested stipend amounts will be applied to all new requests we receive for events that occur on or after July 1, 2024.

As always, if someone is not able to offer the stipend, the parish is always happy to provide the sacrament or service with no fee.


