### A Message from Fr. Cryton,

### God's Healing in our Journey

THE GOSPEL ON 13<sup>TH</sup> SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME reports two stories of healing. One story tells us about a father's great love for his dying daughter. The other story tells us about a desperate woman who risks much as she seeks healing from Jesus. In each story, the request for healing is itself a courageous act of faith, and yet very different circumstances are represented by the lives of each suffering person. Let us learn some important truths explained by Lorna, that we can apply to our own healing journeys from the healing of Jairus' daughter.

# **HEALING GOES HAND IN HAND WITH HONOUR:** *'When he saw him, he fell at his feet'*. Mark 5:22. I think it takes a lot to fall at people's feet, especially for a leader. Whilst the pharisees were full of pride and self-righteousness, Jairus showed humility and faith. If we're believing God for a healing, coming to Jesus with the same heart attitude or reverence, honor and meekness increases our receptivity. Jairus had a high opinion of Jesus, knowing He was the solution. Jairus' honor and trust for Jesus is evident by his not complaining when the woman with the issue of blood delayed them. His daughter was about to die, yet Jairus' esteem for the Lord was more important. How many times do we complain when we feel God is 'taking His time'? or when we think God is more concerned about others? The healing of Jairus' daughter encourages greater humility as we continue to wait patiently for our Father in Heaven to do what He promises.

JESUS ASKS THAT WE TRUST: On the news that Jairus' daughter is now dead, Jesus asked Jairus to believe and trust Him even though the crowds were speaking otherwise. Jesus heals Jairus' daughter after Jairus choose to belief the words of Jesus despite the crowds and human reasoning. This shows us to continue to focus our attention on God's promises rather than the world around us Overhearing what they said, Jesus told him, "Don't be afraid; just believe." Mark 5:36 He asks us to do the same. In a world of doubt and disbelief, let's keep on elevating God's promises through our faith in God healing power.

JESUS' DELAY PROVES A GREATER MIRACLE: Jairus was wanting Jesus to heal his daughter but the Lord wanted to perform a greater miracle, he wanted to resurrect her from the dead. If you're wondering why healing is taking so long, have you ever considered the possibility that the Lord wants to do something greater? Those that receive instant miracles at the start of their healing journey's miss out on the deeper healing that others have to wait a long time for. Never despise God's timing, His ways and His methods. A greater resurrection is around the corner.

### \*\*\*Change to Stipends effective July 1st, 2024\*\*\*

For 30 years the suggested donations for Masses, funerals, and marriages has remained the same throughout the dioceses of Wisconsin. The Bishops of Wisconsin gathered recently and decreed that stipends should be adjusted to reflect the current time and to account for inflation.

The new suggested stipends are as follows: Mass Stipends: \$20 Funerals: \$75 Marriages: \$100 Quinceaneras: \$100 As always, if someone is not able to offer the stipend, the parish is always happy to provide the sacrament or service with no fee.

These new suggested amounts take effect with events that take place on or after July 1, 2024. They do not apply retroactively to those who have already paid the appropriate amount for an upcoming event.

**Mother of Divine Grace, pray for us!** Mary bore for us Jesus, who came not with earthly power, and not as a strict judge, but as the image of goodness and salvation for humanity, as the Grace of God in person. She is therefore rightfully honored as Mother of Divine Grace. St. Ambrose writes of this: "She was called full of grace in virtue of the right which was entirely accorded to her, since she alone received that grace which no other creature attained. For she was filled with the Author of grace, God Himself."

**Mother of mercy, pray for us!** Recently, The Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments gave permission that in Poland there be added to the Litany the invocation, "Mother of Mercy." We pray this after the invocation, "Mother of Divine Grace." The new title was introduced for theological, liturgical, and pastoral reasons. Mary, as the Mother of Jesus Christ, is the Mother of the Divine Mercy manifested in Him (Eph 2: 4–10). She gave expression to this in the words of her Magnificat which she spoke to St. Elizabeth: "His mercy is from generation to generation" (Lk 1:50). This invocation "Mother of Mercy" is already found in the medieval antiphon "Salve Regina".
