

#### October: The Month of the Holy Rosary, Cont....

#### Pope Leo XIII and the Institution of October as the Month of the Rosary

Pope Leo XIII, who deeply appreciated the value of the Rosary, officially dedicated the month of October to the Holy Rosary through an encyclical published on September 1, 1883. In his message, he admonished the faithful to dedicate this month to the Queen of the Holy Rosary, seeking her intercession for the Church's needs.

#### The Structure and Mysteries of the Rosary

The structure of the Rosary as we know it today includes 20 mysteries that meditate upon the principal events in the lives of Jesus and Mary. The Rosary consists of four sets of mysteries: Joyful, Sorrowful, Glorious, and Luminous. The 150 Hail Marys (now expanded to 200) correspond to the number of Psalms in the Bible. This simple yet profound prayer became popular during times when many people were illiterate and could not read the Psalms. The repetition of the Hail Mary was a means of participating in the sacred rhythms of prayer.

The first part of the Hail Mary comes from the Gospel of St. Luke, while the second part was added by Church tradition. The mysteries allow the faithful to meditate upon key moments in the lives of Christ and the Blessed Virgin. Pope Paul VI beautifully remarked that a *Rosary without meditation on these mysteries is like a body without life*, emphasizing the importance of contemplating these holy moments while praying.

#### The Rosary: A Prayer of Love

The repetition of the Hail Mary, which some might consider monotonous, is likened to the constant repetition of affectionate words between lovers. There is beauty in repeating a simple expression of love over and over again, and the Rosary allows us to continuously express our devotion to Mary, our Heavenly Mother, while also seeking her intercession for our needs.

**Gather Your Family for 10 Minutes and Find Greater Peace** | The rosary is a powerful prayer in which we can implore from God what is so badly needed today: the gift of peace and the strengthening of the family. The rosary is also a beautiful prayer in which we reflect on the lives of Jesus and Mary, and this reflection provides helpful guidance in making personal decisions. During October, the month of the rosary, it is an especially important time to gather your family for 10 minutes each day to pray one decade of the rosary. Your family will be strengthened and experience greater peace.

A Minute with Jesus: Recognize God's love in that He sent His Son to give us the Eucharist | It's so important to remember that God is not just loving but He is LOVE itself. Our Heavenly Father reveals – shows us – that He is love and that He desires to share His love by creating us. He created each one of us out of love. Our Heavenly Father only wants to love us. We are able to recognize His love in that Our Father sent His only Son in order to give Himself to us in the Eucharist and to give His life for us on the Cross. Let's pray this now and every day this week: Heavenly Father, thank you for Your love for me. Read how St. John explains how we know that God is love: "Beloved, let us love one another, for love is from God, and whoever loves has been born of God and knows God. Anyone who does not love does not know God, because God is love. In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we have loved God but that He loved us and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us and his love is perfected in us" (1 John 4: 7-12).

Stewardship Bulletin Announcements October 13, 2024 Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time WIS 7:7-11; PS 90:12-13, 14-15, 16-17; HEB 4:12-13; MK 10:17-30 OR 10:17-27 | In today's Gospel, we hear the story of a man who sought guidance in his spiritual journey, like many of us. He ran up to Jesus and asked Him what he must do to attain eternal life. Jesus said, "You are lacking in one thing. Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." It says the man went away sad because he had much. We might cringe when we hear this story because it is sad — this man was so close to becoming an active disciple of Jesus but instead turned away. We also might cringe because we can all relate to the struggle of letting go of something we hold dear. This story is not just about the man in the Gospel but could be profoundly applicable to our lives. Jesus states, "It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for one who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." One of the metaphors for the 'eye of a needle' was a tight passageway into Jerusalem that people had to enter to get into the city. For their camels to pass through, they had to remove whatever the camel was carrying; only then could they enter. This metaphor illustrates the difficulty of fully letting go of our material or emotional attachments to embrace Jesus's teachings. Looking at our lives, we can most likely think of something we carry tightly. Maybe it is possessions—material goods or money—like Jesus references in our Gospel. Or perhaps it is something less material, like status, pride, or control. Jesus doesn't want our stuff — our job promotions, designer house, or bank account. He wants us. So, we must be willing to strip those things from our lives to reach Him. It might seem difficult, but the outcome will be more than we could have imagined — a life filled with His peace and the ultimate treasure in heaven.
