
A Message from Father Cryton:

The Vatican recently introduced "Luce," a cartoon character created as the official mascot for the Catholic Church's upcoming 2025 Jubilee Year. Designed by Simone Legno, the Italian artist behind the popular brand tokidoki, Luce symbolizes themes of hope, faith, and the pilgrimage journey. Dressed in a yellow raincoat that references both the Vatican flag and "life's storms," she carries a pilgrim's staff and wears mud-stained boots to represent life's challenges.



Luce's eyes feature a seashell motif, inspired by the Camino de Santiago, a well-known pilgrimage symbol. Unveiled at the Lucca Comics & Games convention in Italy, Luce is an effort to engage younger audiences by aligning with pop culture aesthetics, especially anime and cartoon styles.

Luce will also represent the Vatican at Expo 2025 in Osaka, Japan, alongside an exhibition of Caravaggio's The





Reactions to Luce have been mixed. While many appreciate the Vatican's attempt to reach younger people, others feel the character is a bit too modern for such a traditional institution. Nonetheless, Luce is part of the Church's broader attempt to remain relatable and accessible in a digital and media-rich world.

Pastoral Letter on End of Life Decisions Includes Clarifications on Burial Practices:

On November 2, All Souls' Day, Wisconsin's bishops released the 4th edition of their pastoral letter on end of life decisions, Now and at the Hour of Our Death (http://www.wisconsincatholic.org/endoflife). Like the previous editions, the 4th edition of the pastoral letter is both a planning tool and a moral guide to prepare for the end of life, urging Catholics to prepare in advance for future medical care and end of life decisions through advance care planning. The 4th edition includes a new section on "Funeral Arrangements and Final Disposition of Bodily Remains," which addresses new practices, such as alkaline hydrolysis and human composting, and explains why these do not respect the dignity of the human person. As an alternative, the Church offers Catholic green burials, in which the shrouded body is lowered directly into the ground. Additionally, the bishops have created a new legal document, Catholic Authorization for Final Disposition (https://www.wisconsincatholic.org/wp-content/uploads/2024/09/Catholic-Authorization-for-Final-Disposition-Instructions-Form.pdf), which can ensure that believers receive a Catholic funeral and are laid to rest in a sacred space.



Archbishop-Designate Grob, 63, will succeed the Most Rev. Jerome E. Listecki and will be installed as Archbishop of Milwaukee on January 14, 2025.

Stewardship Bulletin Announcements November 10, 2024 Thirty-second Sunday In Ordinary Time 1 KGS 17:10-16; PS 146:7-10; HEB 9:24-28; MK 12:38-44 |Today's First Reading from the First Book of Kings and the Gospel passage from Mark both center on the actions of two seemingly poor and helpless widows who show themselves faith-filled and generous stewards—their stories. However, from a different time, it holds valuable lessons for us in our modern lives. In the eyes of the world, particularly in biblical times when there was no life insurance or Social Security, these widows were weak and dependent on others to take care of them. They each found themselves in desperate situations — one amid famine with a child for which to care and the other impoverished. Yet, each demonstrated remarkable courage, strength, and generosity that distinguished them from those around them. From where did this strength come? It came from knowing who they are and to Whom they belong. These women must have known their security would not come from a good life insurance policy or connections to someone with a hidden storehouse of flour. No, their security came from knowing they were the Most High God's daughters and putting their unwavering faith in Him. They did not need to panic amid natural disasters or cling desperately to their menial resources. Their faith in God set them free to trust Him when all seemed hopeless. Their faith kept them detached from material possessions. Their faith allowed them to be brave and generous and to think of others despite their trials. These women saw themselves as stewards, not owners, of the resources God gave them, regardless of how much or how little they had. Their example challenges us to reflect on our stewardship. Are we using our resources in a way that honors God? Are we being gracious and generous, regardless of our circumstances? Their story calls us to action to be better stewards of God's gifts.
