


"Behold: Prayer of the Saints" Young Adult Retreat | Jan. 25, 2025 | Blessed Sacrament Church, La Crosse

The Season of Advent Begins December 1st | Advent is a very important time to prepare ourselves spiritually, leading to a truly meaningful celebration of the birth of the most important person in all of history: Jesus Christ. The traditional customs of our Catholic Faith provide us with important ways to prepare our hearts to welcome the Christ child. One traditional custom is the Advent wreath, which helps us to stay focused on this time of preparation and can be assembled by using evergreen limbs from a tree in the yard and four candles. The evergreens, which retain their green, vibrant life through the year, signify continuous life. The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, symbolizes the eternity of God, the immortality of the soul, and the everlasting life found in Christ who was victorious over sin and death through His Passion, Death and Resurrection. The four candles represent the four weeks of Advent. The light of the candles shines in the darkness, which is most evident during this time of the year as it is darker due to shorter daylight hours. We use candles in the Advent wreath, signifying the coming of Christ who is "the Light that came into the world" to dispel the darkness of sin and to radiate the truth and love of God. Jesus is the Light of the world!

Stewardship Bulletin Reflection November 24, 2024 The Solemnity Of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King Of The Universe Dn 7: 12-14; Ps 93: 1-2, 5; Rev 1: 5-8; Jn 18: 33B-37 | We celebrate the Feast of Christ the King on this last Sunday of Ordinary Time for the liturgical year. Pope Pius XI instituted this feast in 1925 when the world was experiencing a rise of secularism, materialism, and individualism and an increasing denial of Christ's existence and authority. The establishment of this feast was not just a decree from the Pope but a call to action for all of us. It was a collective hope that this feast would achieve three significant goals: that nations would recognize the Church's right to freedom, that leaders and nations would acknowledge their duty to respect Christ, the King of kings, and that we, the faithful, would be encouraged by the reminder that Christ must reign in our hearts, minds, wills, and bodies. As we observe this feast, it's crucial to remember that it holds profound significance for all, particularly for us as Christian stewards. It serves as a poignant reminder of three fundamental truths that guide our stewardship. First, even when it seems the world is spinning out of control, we need not fear because we have a King of kings who is very much in charge, loving, merciful, and just. His authority is our security. Second, if Christ is King of all, He is also King of me. I am not the "lord" of my time, talents, and treasure. He is. I am a valued servant of the King and a steward of His gifts to me, integral to His community. Third, as His disciple, I am called to imitate my King. His humility and service characterize Christ's Kingship, and it should inspire and motivate us to empty Ourselves for the good of others. The Scriptures tell us He went about doing good, and He says of Himself, "I came not to be served but to serve." How can I live other than as a humble servant like my King?
