

A Message from Father Cryton:

The Significance of The Month of November

The Catholic Church gives each month of the year a unique dedication, which are linked to special prayers, specific feast days, and other Catholic devotions, and are a beautiful way to focus our prayer time and grow in our faith.

As per Sarrah Damm, November tends to be a month that is easily overlooked. Perhaps because it is a month that focuses on things coming to an end. We see this in nature as the life cycle reaches its final act: glorious crimson and gold leaves turn brown, fall to the ground, and in a sense, die. We also see this as the liturgical calendar draws to an end and focuses on the Four Last Things: death, Heaven, Hell, and the final judgment.

But considering our own death, or remembering those who have passed before us, is not easy. Rather, it can be quite painful, especially when grief is recent and raw. It does not help that the rest of the world is starting to prepare for Christmas, which is certainly a more festive and fun distraction. But it's not Christmas, yet; it's not even Advent. It's November, and the natural and liturgical are focused on the end. Therefore, is it any wonder that the Church dedicates the month of November to the holy souls who have died but are not yet in Heaven?

This November, instead of jumping into Christmas, what if we entered the month with an openness to what the Lord has for us? We just may discover beautiful ways to pray, significant traditions to honor, and a new connection with the suffering Church in Purgatory. We give thanks for those who have gone before us and we look with prayer and hope to their new life in heaven and our desire to join them there one day.

Stewardship Bulletin Announcements November 3, 2024 Thirty-First Sunday In Ordinary Time DT 6:2-6; PS 18:2-3, 3-4, 47, 51; HEB 7:23-28; MK 12:28B-34 | Today's Gospel presents Jesus' teachings on the two greatest commandments: Love the Lord with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength, and love your neighbor as yourself. These "greatest commandments" relate to three aspects of a Christian steward's daily life: giving our time, talent, and treasure. The use of time refers primarily to our relationship with the Lord — in other words, our prayer life. Since time is a gift from God, I show my love for Him and gratitude for this gift by giving Him the best portion of my time. Setting aside time is not just about setting aside time for prayer but about fostering a personal connection with God, making Him the priority in our daily lives. The use of talents refers to how I offer the abilities, skills, and interests the Lord has given me for the good of those around me. For instance, if you have a talent for cooking, you can prepare meals for those in need. If you are good at teaching, you can volunteer to teach faith formation children in the parish. Doing so is a practical way to "love my neighbor as myself." At the same time, it is also a way to love the Lord with all that I am and have since He has told us that whatever we do for others, we are also doing for Him. Using material gifts-or treasure-likewise demonstrates the love of God and neighbor. When I trustingly offer a sacrificial gift to God through the offertory collection, I am showing Him in a very tangible way that He comes before all else in my life, and I am putting my material resources to the service of my neighbor in the parish community and beyond. Giving should bring us joy, knowing we contribute to the greater good. When we live for God and others, we live a stewardship way of life. And like the wise scribe in today's Gospel, we are moving closer to the kingdom of God, our ultimate destination. A life of service is stewardship's hope and inspiration, guiding us toward our ultimate goal.
