A Message from Father Cryton:

"He Loved Us" (Dilexit Nos) – The Encyclical by Pope Francis

Bishop Battersby has invited us to join with him in implementing his three-year pastoral plan for the Diocese of La Crosse. As per Bishop the first year he wants us to engage ourselves in prayer, listening to the Holy Spirit and allowing the Spirit to work in us. The Bishop has also dedicated and inviting us to take part actively in devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, in the first year of pastoral plan.

It is fitting that Pope Francis has just issues an encyclical **Dilexit Nos (He Loved Us)** this October 24th 2024 during his 12th year of his pontificate. With this document, Pope Francis invites the faithful to deepen their devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, highlighting its transformative power for personal spirituality and the Church's mission to serve a divided, materialistic, and heart-broken world. Let us reflect the first chapter this weekend and the rest in the coming weeks. (The summary is taken from the Vatican News).

Chapter 1: The Importance of the Heart

In the first chapter, Pope Francis reflects on the significance of the heart as a symbol of divine love, especially through devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus: "Let us turn, then, to the heart of Christ, that core of his being, which is a blazing furnace of divine and human love and the most sublime fulfilment to which humanity can aspire. There, in that heart, we truly come at last to know ourselves and we learn how to love" (#30).

He emphasizes that the heart represents the core of human identity and sincerity, much more than just a physical organ. It's where our desires, decisions, and relationships are formed. Without the heart, he argues, modern society has become alienated, preoccupied with technology and distractions, losing sight of the deeper heart-level questions of life: "Who am I? What direction do I want for my life?" The Pope invites us to reengage with our hearts, seeing them as the foundation for spiritual growth, authentic relationships, and societal renewal (#2-5, #8-12).

Francis draws inspiration from Saints Ignatius of Loyola and John Henry Newman, reminding us that true transformation begins when we encounter God's love in the depths of our hearts. Newman's motto, Cor ad cor loquitur ("Heart speaks to heart"), reflects this truth. This interior conversion, Francis says, is key to healing a fragmented world. The Sacred Heart of Christ becomes a source of reconciliation and peace, uniting individuals and communities with the power to renew society. As Francis beautifully expresses it: "Our hearts, united with the heart of Christ, are capable of working this social miracle" (#28-31). To be continued......

A Minute with Jesus: Jesus came into the world to save us by reconciling us with God | Through the original sin, Adam and Eve separated themselves from God. They lost the gift of grace – God's very life within them. They were no longer united with God in a relationship of love. Further, there was nothing Adam and Eve, or you and I, could do to fix the problems instigated by the original sin, above all, our separation from God. The "Good News" is that Jesus came to be among us as our Savior, to reconcile us with God. To accomplish this, Christ established one Church and instituted seven sacraments. Still today the sacraments are the means through which we receive God's gift of grace, His divine life within us. This shows how much God loves us: He wants to be so close that He wants to dwell within us! The holy Eucharist is the greatest of the sacraments by bringing us into the closest union with Jesus on Earth. Let us prepare our hearts before Mass every Sunday for so great a Gift! Let's pray this right now and every day this week: Jesus, thank You for coming for us on the first Christmas, as well as Your coming to us most especially in the holy Eucharist on Christmas. This week, read how the prophet Isaiah announced the coming of the Messiah in Isaiah 11:1-3.

Pray for Will Goodman, a Pro-Life Champion | Will Goodman, who did pro-life work in the Diocese of La Crosse for more than a decade before joining Red Rose Rescue in 2017, is serving a 27-month sentence in federal prison in Danbury, CT for participating in a rescue in 2020 at a late-term abortion clinic in Washington, D.C., where he and several others offered red roses to the women awaiting abortion, seeking to persuade them to give life to their babies. On Sunday, Nov. 15, Will suffered serious injuries at the prison when he fell in his sleep from his top bunk and landed headfirst on the floor. He was rushed by ambulance to the emergency room, where he was vomiting blood. Though it was discovered he had skull fractures, he was sent back to the prison that night, and his nose bled for two days. Will has been experiencing debilitating effects, and his treatment by staff, while mostly professional, has had moments of cruelty. Please consider writing to Will to give him encouragement and support, and the promise of prayer. Stewardship Bulletin Reflection December 1, 2024 First Sunday Of Advent Jer 33: 14-16; Ps 25:4 -5,8-9,10,14; 1 Thes 3:12-4:2; Lk 21:25-28, 34-36 | We have entered the urgent and powerful season of Advent, a time to prepare with awe and wonder for the Feast of the Incarnation of Jesus — born to us as Savior and Brother. It is a season to prepare for His return at the end of time. It is also a moment to remind ourselves that our judgment day is coming, too, when we will have to give an account for all that God has given us during our lifetimes. In other words, Advent is a steward's season! Our readings for the first week of Advent are not just urgent; they also offer us practical advice, calling our attention to these themes of reflection and preparation. They seem to shout, "Wake up! Get ready!" and guide us as we enter this season. The Gospel, from Luke, warns, "Beware that your hearts do not become drowsy from carousing and drunkenness and the anxieties of daily life." How easy it is to lose focus on our Lord either by too much indulgence in our lives or too much worry about our lives. During Advent, we Christian stewards must ask ourselves some hard questions. Am I staying faithful to my prayer life? Am I using my energy and skills to serve others? Am I overly concerned about material gain? Am I relying on my "stuff" or my investments as my source of comfort or security? Am I living for the moment or the coming of the Lord? Get ready, Christian stewards! He's coming! Let us prepare with awe and wonder, and let this preparation inspire us to action.
