A Message from Father Cryton:

"He Loved Us" The Encyclical by Pope Francis Continues....

Pope Francis further highlights the aspects, that devotion to the Sacred Heart should unite to "to nourish us and bring us closer to the Gospel": personal spiritual experience, and community and missionary commitment. Let us reflect the summary of the fourth chapter of the encyclical, "He Loved Us" by Pope Francis this weekend.

Chapter 4: A Love That Gives Itself as Drink

Chapter 4 brings us into the rich biblical and theological imagery of water as a symbol of life, salvation, and love, all fulfilled in the pierced heart of Christ: "The pierced heart of Christ embodies all God's declarations of love present in the Scriptures. That love is no mere matter of words; rather, the open side of his Son is a source of life for those whom he loves, the fount that quenches the thirst of his people" (#101).

Francis explores prophetic texts from Isaiah, Ezekiel, and Zechariah, which point to water as a symbol of new life and purification. Jesus, in the Gospel of John, invites all who thirst to come to him. This invitation culminates on the cross, when blood and water flow from Christ's side, symbolizing the Holy Spirit and the gift of eternal life (#92-101).

The Pope traces the development of the Sacred Heart devotion from the early Church Fathers to medieval mystics like St. Bernard and St. Bonaventure, who saw the pierced side of Christ as the source of grace. Over time, this devotion became a personal, intimate encounter with Christ's love, especially through figures like St. Margaret Mary Alacoque and St. Thérèse of Lisieux: "As for me, I find perfection very easy to practice because I have understood it is a matter of taking hold of Jesus by his heart" (St. Therese).

Francis highlights the consoling nature of this devotion, urging believers to respond to Christ's suffering by offering him love in return (#102-123).

He concludes the chapter with a powerful call to console Christ's wounded heart. Drawing from the reflections of St. Claude de la Colombiere and Pope Pius XI, Francis explains how this desire to offer reparation for the sins of the world heals not only Christ's heart but also the hearts of those who engage in it. The goal is not guilt but a deep, purifying sorrow for sin, which brings about spiritual renewal and peace (#152-163).

"If we truly love the Lord, how could we not desire to console him?" (#152). "And so even now, in a wondrous yet true manner, we can and ought to console that Most Sacred Heart, which is continually wounded by the sins of thankless men" (Pope Pius XI). (The summary is taken from the Vatican news)

Stewardship Bulletin Reflection December 15, 2024 Third Sunday of Advent ZEP 3:14-18A; IS 12:2-6; PHIL 4:4-7; LK3:10-18 | We have reached the joyous Gaudete Sunday (the Latin word for "rejoice") this Third Week of Advent. The Scriptures triumphantly resonate as we continue preparing to celebrate our Savior's birth, filling our hearts with hope and anticipation. Our Second Reading brings us a reason for joy as St Paul reminds us, "The Lord is near. Have no anxiety at all...." He then provides a recipe for preserving this peace: "In everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." Paul's instructions for attaining peace are a comforting Christmas gift. They remind us that we can and should bring all our needs to God and present them to Him with gratitude. This counsel evokes a crucial aspect of a stewardship way of life: gratitude to God in response to His immense love and countless gifts to us. The Gospel passage from Luke shows us how to live out this sense of thankfulness, making our lives a "Christmas gift" to Christ in joyful response to His love for us. When the crowds hear John the Baptist's message that their Savior is coming, they ask him what they should do to prepare. He responds, "Whoever has two cloaks should share with the person who has none. And whoever has food should do the same." This message is a clear call to stewardship to share our material blessings with those in need. He tells tax collectors to stop collecting more than is prescribed and soldiers to be satisfied with their wages. In other words, he tells them to be good and generous stewards of all God's gifts to them! As the great feast of Christmas draws near, let us rejoice in Christ's extravagant love. Let's avail ourselves of the peace He longs to give us. And let's look carefully at our lives to make sure we are indeed making of them a gift fitting for Him. This contemplative look could result in being more generous with our time and resources, forgiving those who wronged us, or living more in line with God's will.
