A Message from Father Cryton: "He Loved Us" Encyclical by Pope Francis – Summary of the Final Chapter

Chapter 5: Love for Love

In the final chapter, Pope Francis reflects on the intense love Christ has for humanity, as seen through the revelations to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque. Christ's Sacred Heart burns with love but often meets indifference. His cry, *"I thirst," is a plea for love in return, especially through the Eucharist. Francis calls the faithful to respond to this divine love not out of obligation, but out of a deep desire to console Christ's heart. He invites us to embrace a life of love and service, especially to the poor and marginalized, as a way of offering love for love (#164-171).*

This devotion, Francis explains, is not just about personal piety; it has always been linked to service. Saints like Augustine and Bernard stressed that our union with Christ enables us to become fountains of love for others. This love manifests itself in humble acts of charity and service, transforming the world and building a civilization of love (#172-179).

Finally, Pope Francis emphasizes the theme of reparation—healing the wounds caused by sin and injustice. Acts of reparation go beyond personal piety to include concrete actions of social justice and mercy. He challenges us to repair the damage done by selfishness and indifference by actively engaging in love, service, and solidarity. Through this mission, Christians participate in Christ's redemptive love, bringing about healing and transformation in the world (#180-220).

Concluding prayer by Pope Francis

Pope Francis concludes with a heartfelt prayer: "I ask our Lord Jesus Christ to grant that his Sacred Heart may continue to pour forth the streams of living water that can heal the hurt we have caused, strengthen our ability to love and serve others, and inspire us to journey together towards a just, solidary and fraternal world. Until that day when we will rejoice in celebrating together the banquet of the heavenly kingdom in the presence of the risen Lord, who harmonizes all our differences in the light that radiates perpetually from his open heart. May he be blessed forever". (The summary of the encyclical is taken from the Vatican news).

"Getting Ready" | During these final days of Advent, we want to step back from our busy lives, taking time in stillness and solitude, to reflect more deeply on the mystery of God's Incarnation – Jesus taking on human flesh to be among us. This time of penance and sacrifice can include something like not having dessert occasionally, turning off the TV for one night or setting aside an electronic device for an hour. This can include helping someone in need or visiting a person who is lonely. We offer small sacrifices so that during this season of grace we might have an open, welcoming heart with more room to receive Jesus on Christmas. We will be surprised how these long-held Catholic traditions of preparing allow us to see and understand truths that may be hidden from our human eyes. In the silence of prayer, the Lord will give us new insights, that we may see with "spiritual eyes" and understand better the wonder of the mystery of the birth of Jesus, our Savior.

Stewardship Bulletin Reflection December 22, 2024 Fourth Sunday of Advent MI 5:1-4A; PS 80: 2-3, 15-16, 18-19; HEB 10: 5-10; LK 1: 39-45 | Our Blessed Mother takes center stage on this fourth Sunday of Advent, and fittingly so, as we draw near to the celebration of her Son's birth. After our Lord Himself, Mary is our model and guide to a stewardship way of life. Today's Gospel passage from Luke vividly describes Mary's immediate actions after her "yes" to the angel Gabriel's message. She hurriedly traveled to the hill country to a town in Judah... and greeted Elizabeth. This swift and selfless act of thinking of others before herself models two pillars of stewardship—Hospitality and Service. What warmth and humility the Mother of our Savior shows, traveling to Elizabeth to spend time with her, rejoicing with Elizabeth over her incredible pregnancy, and assisting her in a time of need. The joy this hospitality and service brings Elizabeth is a testament to the uplifting power of serving others. Our Blessed Mother's example of stewardship is one that we, her children, can follow in our lives today. With all the gifts God gives us—our time, talents, and material possessions—we can also offer ourselves to God by using these gifts to serve and glorify Him. In so doing, we will not only spread the Good News of the Gospel, but we will be significant contributors to the world around us today. As we follow in the footsteps of our Blessed Mother, we too will be stewards after her own heart, responsible and engaged in the service of others.
