

#### A Message from Father Cryton:

## "He Loved Us" Encyclical by Pope Francis, continues...

**"He loved us',** Saint Paul says of Christ (Rom 8:37), in order to make us realize that nothing can ever **"separate us"** from that love (Rom 8:39)". The Encyclical is dedicated to the human and divine love of the Heart of Jesus Christ: **"His open heart has gone before us and waits for us, unconditionally, asking only to offer us His love and friendship,"** the Pope writes in the introductory paragraph. **"For 'He loved us first'** (1 Jn 4:10). Because of Jesus, **'we have come to know and believe in the love that God has for us'** (1 Jn 4:16)." Let us reflect the second and the third chapters of the encyclical this weekend.

#### **Chapter 2: Actions and Words of Love**

In Chapter 2, Pope Francis shows how the heart of Jesus, beyond being a symbol, is the foundation of the Gospel's message: *"The heart of Christ, as the symbol of the deepest and most personal source of his love for us, is the very core of the initial preaching of the Gospel. It stands at the origin of our faith, as the wellspring that refreshes and enlivens our Christian beliefs" (#32).* 

Jesus' encounters in the Gospels, whether comforting the sick or forgiving sinners, demonstrate the depth of God's love through personal and compassionate actions. The Pope highlights Jesus' ability to see deeply into people's hearts, as in his transformative gaze toward the rich young man (#32-43). Through Jesus' humanity, his emotions, his grief, and ultimately, his sacrifice on the cross, his heart becomes the most eloquent *"word of love"* (#46). Francis challenges us to make Christ's sacrificial love the center of our lives, just as Saint Paul did when he proclaimed, *"The Son of God... loved me and gave himself for me"* (Gal 2:20).

## Chapter 3: This Is the Heart That Has Loved So Greatly

Devotion to the Sacred Heart is not just about venerating an image but engaging in a living relationship with Christ himself. In Chapter 3, Pope Francis explains how the heart of Jesus symbolizes boundless divine and human love, calling us into personal intimacy. This devotion, deeply rooted in Trinitarian love, draws us into a relationship where divine and human love meet in Christ (#48-54).

Through the Sacred Heart, we encounter Christ not as an abstract idea but as a living Savior who invites us into trust and dialogue. Pope Francis writes, *"The venerable image portraying Christ holding out his loving heart... invites us to encounter, dialogue, and trust"* (#54). Francis encourages believers to embrace this devotion, urging everyone to echo the prayer of St. Thérèse of Lisieux: *"Jesus, I trust in you"* (#75-90). 

Last weekend Father spoke on the Bishop's three year plan for our diocese, and that this year will be the year of the Sacred Heart of Jesus where we will enthrone the image of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in our homes. As not all may be familiar with this practice, we would like to share some information on it:

Jesus promised St. Margaret Mary Alacoque that He "will bless the home in which the image of my Sacred Heart shall be exposed and honored." When we enthrone (display) the image of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in a prominent place and signify that Jesus is the King, friend and brother of the family, we are responding to the invitation of the Church to make our homes "Domestic Churches", wherein Jesus is the center and source of love for all. As the sanctuary church lamp reminds us of Christ's presence in the tabernacle, the enthroned image of the Sacred Heart reminds us that Jesus is among us and with us. By this covenant we make our homes and hearts His tabernacle. In an Enthronement ceremony, a blessed picture or a statute of the Sacred Heart of Jesus is used. Any image is usable, as long as it replicates what St. Margaret Mary described seeing when Our Lord appeared to her:

- Around His Heart is a crown of thorns.
- There is a wound, from the soldier's spear, showing that our sins hurt Him in the Heart.
- The flames coming from His Heart show the intensity of His Love.
- Above the flames is a cross showing that His Love for us was so great that He died for us.

Stewardship Bulletin Reflection December 8, 2024 Second Sunday of Advent BAR 5:1-9; PS 126: 1-6; PHIL 1: 4-6, 8-11; LK 3: 1-6 | The readings for the Second Week of Advent offer both encouragement and challenge as we reflect and prepare for Christ's two "comings" — His coming as a baby on the great feast of Christmas and the anticipation of His second coming at the end of time. Our First Reading, from Baruch, is a beautiful reminder that God has triumphed over sin and death and that we — His faithful disciples — will live in the light of His glory one day. Until He returns, we must remain faithful to Him as true disciples and good stewards of all the gifts He has given us. While it can be tempting to give in to the materialism and calls for self-indulgence that surrounds us (ironically more than ever at this time of year), this reading calls us back to the spiritual reality that this life is passing and that we are made for eternal life with God. We are called to prepare for eternal life by the way that we use our time, our talents, and our treasure now. The Gospel reading from Luke shows us how personal and detailed God's love for humanity is as He prepared the way for Christ's coming among us. We are told the precise time, place, and person. He appointed John the Baptist to announce the arrival of our Savior. John tells us how to celebrate with joy this first 'coming' on the feast of Christmas and how to prepare for the second coming — through repentance. Let's reaffirm our commitment to turn away from bad habits or sins that may have crept into our lives and turn our hearts and minds back to Christ this Advent. Our turning toward Christ is what the stewardship way of life is all about — moving closer in relationship with Christ and imitating Him, ready to celebrate His birth, with eyes fixed on eternal life with Him.
