



A Message from Father Cryton:

Litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus

As per the request of Bishop Battersby, we have begun to pay special attention towards devotion to Sacred Heart of Jesus part of pastoral plan of the Bishop for the Diocese of La Crosse. We also have begun to pray the litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus from the first Sunday of January to mark the above-mentioned intention. Let me explain the history and the meaning behind praying the litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

The Litany of the Sacred Heart is a Catholic devotional prayer that explores different aspects of Jesus's divine love and mercy as symbolized by His Sacred Heart. Each invocation is meant to help the faithful meditate on different aspects of Christ's love and to deepen their relationship with Him.

This was formally approved by Pope Leo XIII in 1899, though devotion to the Sacred Heart has much earlier origins, particularly through the visions of St. Margaret Mary Alacoque in the 17th century.

Divine Attributes in the Litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus

I'll delve deeper into the divine attributes expressed in the Litany of the Sacred Heart, which reveal profound theological truths about Jesus's divine nature:

- 1. "Heart of Jesus, Son of the Eternal Father" This invocation emphasizes Jesus's divine sonship It reflects the eternal relationship within the Trinity Highlights that Jesus is not created but eternally begotten of the Father Points to Jesus's equal dignity with the Father while maintaining distinct personhood
- 2. "Heart of Jesus, formed by the Holy Spirit in the womb of the Virgin Mother" Speaks to the mystery of the Incarnation Shows the Holy Spirit's role in Jesus's conception Emphasizes both divine action and human cooperation through Mary Demonstrates how divinity entered into human nature
- 3. "Heart of Jesus, substantially united to the Word of God" Refers to the hypostatic union the joining of divine and human natures in Christ "Substantially" emphasizes this isn't just a moral union but a complete fusion of natures Reflects the teaching of Chalcedon that Christ is fully God and fully human Shows how Jesus's heart encompasses both divine and human love
- 4. "Heart of Jesus, of Infinite Majesty" Proclaims Christ's divine kingship Points to His unlimited power and authority Reflects His eternal nature and boundless greatness Reminds us that His heart, though loving, is also worthy of supreme adoration
- 5. "Heart of Jesus, Holy Temple of God" Shows Christ's body as the dwelling place of divinity References Jesus's words about the temple of His body Connects to the Old Testament temple as God's dwelling place Emphasizes the sacred nature of Christ's humanity
- 6. "Heart of Jesus, Tabernacle of the Most High" Similar to the temple reference but more intimate Points to Jesus as the meeting place between God and humanity Recalls the Old Testament tabernacle where God dwelt among His people Emphasizes Christ's role as mediator between divine and human
- 7. "Heart of Jesus, House of God and Gate of Heaven" Shows Christ as the way to the Father References Jacob's vision at Bethel Emphasizes Jesus's role in making heaven accessible to humanity Points to His heart as the entrance to divine life. These divine attributes help us understand Christ's divine nature They show how divinity and humanity are united in Jesus They show how Jesus is both fully divine and fully human, with His heart representing the perfect union of divine and human love. A Minute with Jesus: Jesus' name means "God saves" | The angel told Joseph in a dream that this Child was to be called "Jesus, for He will save His people from their sin" (Matt 1: 21). Jesus saves us from our sins by dying on the Cross and then giving us His resurrected body in the Eucharist. The holy Eucharist is the Church's most precious treasure. What a gift, that we may have a life-giving encounter with Jesus, truly present in the Eucharist. Let's pray this right now and every day this week: Jesus, thank You for coming into the world to give us the greatest gift – Yourself in the holy Eucharist. This week, read the account of the angel appearing to Joseph in Matt 1: 18-25

Stewardship Bulletin Reflection January 12, 2025 — The Baptism of the Lord IS 42:1-4, 6-7 or IS 40:1-5, 9-11; PS 29:1-4, 9-10 or PS 104:1B-4, 24-25, 27-30; ACTS 10: 34-38 or TI 2:11-14; 3: 4-7; LK 3:15-16; 21-22 | As we celebrate this feast of the Baptism of the Lord, we can study His actions at the Jordan River as a powerful example of servant leadership. We see in Jesus a type of leadership characterized by humility and leading by example. It's a paradox that the sinless Savior, who did not need a baptism of repentance, chose to be baptized. This act of humility, where Jesus made Himself one with his people, was a powerful demonstration of servant leadership. It was a way for Him to draw us closer, to create a relationship with us, and to open us to His teachings and influence. As a servant leader, Jesus leads by example. He doesn't just tell the people they need to be baptized. He shows them how and does it Himself to teach them. To lead like Jesus, we must "walk the walk" and not just "talk the talk." As followers of Jesus, it is our responsibility to emulate his actions. If we want those we lead to be generous and hard-working, we must show them how to do this by demonstrating generosity and hard work ourselves. Immediately after His baptism, we witness a powerful affirmation of Jesus' leadership. The Father opens the heavens, sends the Holy Spirit upon Jesus in bodily form, and audibly declares, "This is my beloved Son with whom I am well-pleased." This divine affirmation reminds us that when we follow Jesus and emulate His servant-leadership, the Father will also be pleased with us. Let us be grateful for our amazing God and be reminded that when we are grateful followers of Jesus and servant-leaders in imitation of Him, the Father will be well-pleased with us, too. Our gratitude is not just a pleasing gesture to the Father but a testament to our understanding of His grace and our commitment to His teachings.
