A Message from Father Cryton:

Litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus - Cont......

Last Sunday I explained the Divine attributes in the Litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Let me elaborate this week, the qualities of Christ's love as expressed in the Litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, which beautifully illustrates the nature and characteristics of divine love:

Qualities of Christ's Love

- 1. "Heart of Jesus, Burning Furnace of Charity" Represents the intensity and ardor of Christ's love The image of fire suggests purifying and transforming love Indicates how His love constantly radiates and gives warmth Shows His love as active and consuming, like a flame Points to how His love can ignite love in others' hearts
- **2. "Heart of Jesus, Patient and Most Merciful"** Highlights Christ's endless patience with human weakness Shows His mercy that extends beyond human failings Reflects His willingness to forgive repeatedly Demonstrates His gentle approach to human frailty Connected to His response to sinners in the Gospels
- 3. "Heart of Jesus, Rich in Mercy" Emphasizes the abundance of His forgiveness Shows there's no limit to His mercy Indicates His readiness to forgive all who turn to Him Reflects the parable of the Prodigal Son Demonstrates the inexhaustible nature of divine mercy
- **4. "Heart of Jesus, Full of Goodness and Love"** Points to the completeness of His love Shows His fundamental orientation toward what is good Indicates His desire for human wellbeing Reflects His perfect charity toward all Demonstrates His constant benevolence
- **5. "Heart of Jesus, Abyss of All Virtues"** Shows Christ as containing all possible virtues Indicates the depth and completeness of His perfection Points to Him as the source of all virtue Suggests the unfathomable nature of His goodness Reflects His role as model of all virtues
- **6.** "Heart of Jesus, Most Worthy of All Praise" Acknowledges His perfect deserving of praise Shows the appropriate response to His love Indicates His surpassing excellence Points to His worthiness of worship Reflects the eternal praise He receives in heaven
- 7. "Heart of Jesus, King and Center of All Hearts" Shows His sovereignty over human hearts Indicates His role as the pattern for human love Points to Him as the focus of all authentic love Demonstrates His central place in Christian life Reflects His desire to draw all hearts to Himself

These qualities show several key aspects of Christ's love: - Its intensity and transformative power - Its patience and gentleness - Its abundance and generosity - Its perfection and completeness - Its attractiveness and worthiness The litany presents these qualities to: - Help us understand divine love better - Give us a pattern for our own love - Draw us into deeper relationship with Christ - Show us the nature of perfect love - Inspire trust and confidence in His love. Stewardship Bulletin Reflection January 19, 2025 — Second Sunday in Ordinary Time IS 62:1-5; PS 96: 1-3,7-10; 1 COR 12:4-11; JN 2:1-11 | Today's Gospel reading from John brings to life the timeless story of the wedding feast at Cana, a pivotal moment when Jesus inaugurated His public ministry by performing His first miracle at His mother's behest. Amid the feast, the Blessed Mother noticed that the wine had run out and pointed out the problem to Jesus. Then, she gave the servants instructions equally applicable to us modern-day stewards, saying, "Do whatever He tells you." Jesus gave the servants a simple and seemingly mundane task: fill some stone jars with water. They did what He told them to do. Jesus used their obedience to accomplish that simple task and perform His first miracle, turning the water into the choicest wine. Our Lord didn't have to involve those servants in performing this miracle — He chose to. And today, 2,000 plus years later, He still chooses to include us in performing His miracles through our cooperation in using the gifts and talents He has given us. His inclusion of us is not a privilege but a testament to our value in His plan. Let us heed our Blessed Mother's words: examine our lives this week to see if we are "doing whatever He tells us," cooperating with God to use the gifts He has given us to benefit those around us. If we take this call seriously, He will perform miracles in our families and parish. Let us heed our Blessed Mother's words. Let's take this week to reflect on our lives and actions to see if we are genuinely doing whatever He tells us and cooperating with God to use the gifts He has given us to benefit those around us.
