A Message from Father Cryton:

Epiphany – A Call to Seek the Lord

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On this Feast of the Epiphany, we are reminded of the profound journey of the Magi, who followed the light of the star in search of the newborn King. Their journey is a powerful reflection of our own call to seek—to seek God, truth, purpose, and a deeper relationship with our Creator. The story of the Magi teaches us three lessons about this sacred call to seek:

1. Seeking Requires Faith and Courage

The Magi stepped into the unknown, trusting that the star would guide them to something extraordinary. Similarly, our call to seek often requires stepping out of our comfort zones and trusting in God's guidance, even when the path is unclear.

2. Seeking Demands Perseverance

The journey of the Magi was long and filled with challenges, but they persisted. In our lives, seeking God is not always easy. There may be moments of doubt, distraction, or difficulty, but like the Magi, we are called to persevere, knowing the reward of finding Christ is greater than any struggle.

3. Seeking Leads to Worship and Transformation

When the Magi finally found the Christ Child, they bowed in worship and presented their gifts. True seeking leads us to moments of awe, gratitude, and surrender. It transforms our hearts and compels us to offer our very best to God.

This Epiphany, I encourage you to reflect on your own journey of seeking. Where is God calling you to follow His light? What obstacles must you overcome to draw closer to Him? And how can you, like the Magi, respond with faith, perseverance, and worship?

As we begin this new year, may we embrace the call to seek with open hearts and steadfast spirits. Let us be guided by the light of Christ, allowing it to lead us to deeper faith, renewed hope, and transformative love.

A Minute with Jesus: Wise men came to worship Jesus | Wise men from far away saw an incredibly bright star moving across the sky. They followed the star to see where it would take them. It led them to the Infant Jesus. The Magi gave precious gifts to adore the Christ Child, which reveal this holy Child's identity; God becoming man: gold for Christ's kingship, frankincense for His divinity and myrrh for His anointing after His sacrifice on the Cross. Jesus gives us the greatest Gift – the Gift of Himself in the Eucharist again and again in a life-giving encounter. Let's pray this right now and every day this week: Jesus, the wise man brought You precious gifts. Thank You for giving us the most precious Gift of Yourself in the Eucharist. This week, read how the wise men came to worship Jesus and bring Him gifts in Matthew 2:1-12

Stewardship Bulletin Reflection January 5, 2025 — The Epiphany Of The Lord IS 60: 1-6; PS 72: 1 -2, 7-8, 10-13; EPH 3: 2-3A, 5-6; MT 2: 1-12 | Today is the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord. For centuries, we Catholics celebrated this Feast on January 6. Still, many years ago, the decision was made (at least in the United States) to celebrate the Epiphany on the Sunday between January 2 and January 8. "Epiphany" means "manifestation." On this day, Jesus Christ, the Messiah, is revealed as the light of all nations. Officially, Christmas is not over. The Church recommends that on this day, those who display a crèche, a nativity, or a manger scene should replace the shepherd and sheep with the Magi and their likely animals on which they traveled and their gifts. However, that is all secondary to the real meaning of this day. At Christmas, the Messiah Jesus was revealed to the shepherds, who were Jewish. But on this day, the Lord is revealed to all nations and the Gentiles (represented by the Magi). We are familiar with the star the Magi followed, but we must understand everything that is happening and what it means. This star represents the Light of Christ, a Light which we honor and commemorate today. Right now, we are called to be the Light of Christ to those around us and those with whom we come in contact. That way, we can be the disciples Christ wants us to be. The poet William Cullen Bryant captures the significance of the star the Magi followed very well when he wrote, "O Father, may that Holy Star, Grow every year more bright, And send its glorious beams afar, To fill the world with light."
