



A Message from Father Cryton....

February - "Month of Love"

February, often celebrated as the "month of love," provides a meaningful opportunity to reflect on love in its many forms—divine, interpersonal, and self-love. While Valentine's Day is traditionally associated with romantic love, a deeper understanding of love encompasses our connection to the divine, our relationships with others, and the love we show ourselves.

Divine Love: At its core, divine love is unconditional, infinite, and transcendent. Many faiths and spiritual traditions describe divine love as a guiding force that nurtures, protects, and uplifts. This love teaches us to trust in a higher power and to live with compassion and grace. Reflecting on divine love in February reminds us that we are deeply valued and cherished, not just by those around us but by a presence greater than ourselves. It invites us to cultivate faith, gratitude, and a sense of purpose in our daily lives.

Interpersonal Love: Love between people is an essential part of human experience. True interpersonal love is built on respect, kindness, and selflessness. February's emphasis on love can be an invitation to deepen our relationships, express gratitude, and be more present for those we care about. It also reminds us that love is not only about receiving but also about giving—listening, supporting, and uplifting others.

Self-Love: Often overlooked, self-love is just as important as the love we share with others. It is the foundation of our well-being, allowing us to set healthy boundaries, practice self-care, and embrace our worth. In a world that often focuses on external validation, February can serve as a reminder to nurture ourselves—to speak kindly to ourselves, honor our needs, and recognize that we are deserving of love, just as we are.

The Interconnection of Love: Divine, interpersonal, and self-love are deeply interconnected. When we feel secure in divine love, we are better able to love ourselves and, in turn, love others more fully. When we practice self-love, we show up more authentically in our relationships. Love, in all its forms, is a force that unites and strengthens us.

This February, beyond the chocolates and flowers, we can reflect on love as a transformative power—one that connects us to the divine, strengthens our relationships, and allows us to embrace our own worth with compassion and grace.

Jubilee 2025—Pray as 'Pilgrims of Hope' | We live in a time of much anxiety, fear, unsettledness and discontent. The theme for this Jubilee Year 2025 should capture our attention, with its focus on hope. Hope is an incredible virtue which is given to us by God at baptism that disposes us to live in relationship with the Blessed Trinity. Hope is the virtue "by which we desire the Kingdom of Heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit" (CCC #1817). During this year of hope, "let us lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus" (Heb. 12:1-2). One way to participate in Jubilee 2025 is to receive the sacraments on a more frequent basis. The sacrament of the holy Eucharist - Jesus Himself - opens our eyes to see His power and love in action in our daily lives and those around us. Let us join the parish family in gathering together each Sunday (or Saturday evening) to be strengthened in the powerful gift of hope.

Stewardship Bulletin Reflection February 16, 2025 - Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time JER 17: 5-8; PS 1:1-4,6; 1 COR 15:12, 16-20; LK 6: 17, 20-26 | Today's readings speak of an essential quality for the Christian steward: hope. Hope as a vital quality is especially fitting this year, as Pope Francis has designated 2025 as a Jubilee Year with the theme "Pilgrims of Hope." This theme unites us all as we embark on a journey of hope and faith. According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, "Hope is the theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our strength but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit (CCC 1817)." In many ways, this is the very definition of a stewardship way of life — focusing on eternity as we live our daily lives and relying on God to provide for our needs and satisfy our deepest longings for meaning and happiness right now. Living a stewardship way of life can be as simple as volunteering at a local charity, being mindful of environmental impact, or sharing one's talents with the community; in any way, we where we put our Time, Talents, and Treasures into action for the good of others. In today's Gospel from Luke, Jesus describes the true richness of life possible for those willing to live as his hopefilled disciples. We are all familiar with this passage in which Jesus reveals the Beatitudes: blessed are the poor; they have the kingdom of God. Blessed are those now hungry because they will be satisfied. Blessed are those who weep because they will laugh. Blessed are those who are hated, excluded, and insulted because they are disciples of Jesus; their reward will be heaven. Jesus is describing here the character of one living a life of hope - the life of a Christian steward whose trust is firmly rooted in God and who focuses on others and eternity. It is a life filled with joy, fulfillment, and the promise of eternal reward.
