Being Close to God - The Foundation of True Joy and Fulfillment

Being close to God gives people a sense of purpose, peace, and guidance in life. Many find that a strong relationship with God helps them navigate challenges, find meaning in their struggles, and develop inner strength. It provides comfort in times of pain, clarity in times of confusion, and hope in times of despair.

Beyond personal benefits, being close to God encourages love, kindness, and compassion toward others. It helps shape moral values, fosters gratitude, and deepens one's understanding of life beyond material things. For many, it's the foundation of true joy and fulfillment.

Today, think about how close to God you feel. Do you really feel God is with you and that He knows and cares about you? Do you feel God is really involved in your life, or do you feel He is far away from you? Dennis Abernathy gives Four simple steps you can take to get closer to God.

First, decide you really want to be close to God: James 1:7-8speaks of a "double-minded" man who really hasn't made up his mind about what he wants. The Bible says that man should not expect to receive anything from God! Yes, to get close to God, you must decide you really want to.

Second, do the will of God: Jesus said: "If anyone loves Me, he will keep My Word; and My Father will love him, and We will come to him, and make Our abode with him." (John 14:23)

Third, **listen to God every day**: As you read and meditate on the Scriptures daily, you will find that the Word of God, the Scriptures, is very persuasive and compelling. The Scriptures have drawing power, and they will draw you closer to God. In Isaiah 55:3, God Himself said: "Incline your ear and come to Me. Listen, that you may live."

Fourth, **speak to God every day**: Jesus often spoke to His Father in prayer, sometimes rising before dawn to find a quiet place and time. On at least one occasion He spent an entire night in prayer. We desperately need to recognize our need for prayer. As we share our burdens and needs with God, we will find ourselves being drawn closer and closer to Him.

Reminder: There is a basket in the vestibule to collect palms from last year to be burned for Ash Wednesday's Mass.

Stewardship Bulletin Reflection February 23, 2025 - Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time 1 SM 26: 2, 7-9, 12-13, 22-23; PS 103: 1-4, 8, 10, 12-13; 1 COR 15: 45-49; LK 6: 27-38 | In today's Gospel, taken from the sixth chapter of Luke, Jesus offers a very challenging, seemingly impossible approach to daily life. "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you. To the person who strikes you on one cheek, offer the other one as well, and from the person who takes your cloak, do not withhold even your tunic." It makes one want to say, "Seriously, Lord?" And He doesn't stop there. Jesus adds, "Give to everyone who asks of you, and from the one who takes what is yours, do not demand it back." At first glance, Jesus's teachings may seem unfair. However, when we shift our perspective and view this way of life through the lens of stewardship, it becomes doable (though challenging) and starts to make perfect sense. A steward clearly understands that all he has and is — his very life — is a gift from God given to him from an unfathomable abundance of love. Recognizing that one's own life itself is a gift changes everything! Then one understands this means "my" cloak, "my" tunic, "my" money, and "my" time — all of it ultimately belongs to God. He has entrusted these things to each of us in love to use for His purposes and glory. So, does this mean we are to be passive "doormats" to anyone who wants to take advantage of us? Certainly not. Jesus explains this in the following verse of this passage when He says, "Do to others as you would have them do to you." There is nothing wrong with loving oneself since God loves us and has made us in His image and likeness. Jesus asks that we approach others and share our gifts with this same attitude. He is giving us a definition of real love, a steward's love that is not just about giving but about sharing with the understanding that all we have is ultimately God's, and we are merely stewards of His gifts.
