Some Additional Note on the Mass of Reparation by Bishop Gerard Battersby

Lenten Greetings!

In anticipation of our upcoming Mass of Reparation (10am, St. Joseph Cathedral of the Workman, March 27th), I wanted to share some of my thoughts about the day. What does this mass of reparation mean?

It would be good for us to take a look at the actions of the Maccabee's on behalf of their slain who had placed their trust in idolatrous amulets and not on the Lord God: they prayed in supplication that the sinful deed would be fully blotted out (2 Maccabee's 12:42). All sin has a social dimension, that is the effect the rebellion from God's plan, that reaches out in a sense to all the Body of Christ. One can say that sin leaves a mark, and that grave sin unrepaired, can even shackle a person or people from receiving the bounty God has set apart for them. Some sins cry out to heaven, as Abel's blood did (cf. Genesis 4:10). They put an obstacle in the proclamation of the Gospel and the reception of the Good News until someone on behalf of those who by death cannot repent, repents.

We will gather together to repent for those ways which our ancestors and even ourselves have mortgaged our future. We do so because it is right that God's laws be obeyed, it is right that we love our neighbor as ourselves, it is right that we say sorry when we offend, it is right that we trust in faith that the blood of the Lamb of God will take away the sins of our both our past and present, if we but repent and believe in the Gospel. We repent first on behalf of the Body of Christ and the Church in La Crosse, in all areas under my authority and yours, that we repent for the dead and the living bishops, priests, religious, deacons, and laity.

We repent for those souls who have committed acts that are inhuman, acts that are in civil, unkind, idolatrous, blasphemous, acts that we often deem as trifling, such that we call them "white lies or gossip" for instance, which despite our protestations to the contrary have outsized effects in unravelling the social fabric. We repair sins that we did not commit and we repair by our act of humility the sins which hold us back in becoming the priests and people whom the Holy Spirit desires to set ablaze with evangelical fervor. I intend to grant a partial indulgence to those who will participate in this act of reparation either in person or by video.

This mass is open to all and I ask that you encourage some form of participation on the part of your parishioners. Please ask them to pray for the bishop, the priests, the deacons, religious and laity of the Diocese. I don't expect to mention every sin that needs repairing, I expect that together we will cast off our crowns and say as one, have mercy Lord for we have sinned. Please do your best to participate in a way that is fitting for you and your people. I thank in advance those priests who have helped me think about renewal, those men and women who have contributed to remembering things we need to repent of, and those who have helped make this Mass of Reparation a reality. Please remember this, this and other acts are meant to prepare the kindling of our hearts to be set ablaze for the sake of renewal. Renewal is God's plan and if we suffer to draw near to him, he will accomplish this for us.

Stewardship Bulletin Reflection March 16, 2025 - Second Sunday of Lent GN 15:5-12, 17-18; PS 27:1, 7-9, 13-14; PHIL 3:17-4:1 or PHIL 3:20-4:1; LK 9:28B-36 | In last week's Gospel, we followed Jesus into the desert, where He fasted and prayed. This week, He leads us up a mountain to witness His Transfiguration. Why both of these experiences? He is preparing us to go with Him in a few short weeks to a hilltop - Golgotha - where He will lay down His life for our sake. This ultimate sacrifice is a profound demonstration of His love for us. He will finally take us to an empty cave where He triumphed over sin and death. Jesus perfectly understands our humanity. He knows we need desert experiences — times of self-denial and testing — to arrive at mountain-top moments when we see and feel His glorious presence in our lives. The Apostles' reaction to Jesus' Transfiguration is a powerful example. They "had been overcome by sleep, but becoming fully awake, they saw his glory." This awakening, this realization of His glory, is what we strive for in our spiritual journey. The reason for our fasting, prayer, and almsgiving during Lent is to be reawakened to all God has done for humanity and all He has done for each of us personally. It is too easy to get lulled into complacency in our daily routines and "sleepwalk" through life. While nothing is inherently sinful in this routine, Christ calls us to do much more as Christian stewards. He calls us to be responsible, committed, and actively participate in His work. This Lent, let us train ourselves, or more precisely, allow Him to train us to say "Yes" to His will and to offer our lives back to Him in gratitude. In so doing, we, too, will become "transfigured." This season of Lent is a powerful opportunity for transformation, a time when we can awaken to a new, more spiritually fulfilling way of life. So we live fully awake; this is a stewardly way of life and glorious indeed.
