

The Feast of Divine Mercy will be celebrated on April 27th, with the Divine Mercy Novena beginning on Good Friday, April 18th. A downloadable page with simple directions for praying the Chaplet of Divine Mercy (which takes about five to seven minutes), along with the short daily novena prayer, is also available at the same link. "Let no one fear to approach the fountain of mercy - the Sacred Heart of Jesus - seeking His healing, strength for daily life and the help to reorient ourselves to the love of Christ." — Bishop Battersby

#### What is the meaning of Divine Mercy Sunday?

Divine Mercy Sunday is celebrated on the Sunday after Easter, which is the last day of the Easter Octave. In 2025, the feast is on April 27. During the course of Jesus' revelations to Saint Faustina on the Divine Mercy He asked on numerous occasions that a feast day be dedicated to the Divine Mercy and that this feast be celebrated on the Sunday after Easter. The liturgical texts of the day, the 2nd Sunday of Easter, concern the institution of the Sacrament of Penance, the Tribunal of the Divine Mercy, and are thus already suited to the request of Our Lord. This Feast, which had already been granted to the nation of Poland and been celebrated within Vatican City, was granted to the Universal Church by Pope John Paul II on the occasion of the canonization of Sr. Faustina on 30 April 2000. In a decree dated 23 May 2000, the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments stated that "throughout the world, the Second Sunday of Easter will receive the name Divine Mercy Sunday, a perennial invitation to the Christian world to face, with confidence in divine benevolence, the difficulties and trials that mankind will experience in the years to come."

In preparation for this Feast of Divine Mercy, Our Lord asked that the faithful pray a novena, beginning on Good Friday. Each day of the novena has a different intention that is dear ot the Heart of Jesus, including all sinners, priests and Religious, souls of children, those in Purgatory, and finally lukewarm souls.

As we meditate on each of these prayers throughout the nine days, we will come to a better understanding of Our Lord and His love for mankind, the Divine Mercy that He pours out on each one of us.

Divine Mercy Chaplet

Introduction: Our Father, Hail Mary, & The Apostles Creed.

On the Our Father beads, pray:

Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ-in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

On the Hail Mary beads, pray: For the sake of His sorrowful Passion-have mercy on us and on the whole world. (x10)

#### Repeat decade cycle 5 times

**Concluding Prayer:** Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One-have mercy on us and on the whole world. (x3)

A Minute with Jesus: Jesus rose from the dead on Easter Sunday. Jesus is alive! We receive the living resurrected Christ in holy Communion. Jesus holds nothing back in the holy Eucharist. He gives Himself completely to us when we receive Him at Mass every Sunday. Receiving His resurrected body and blood will raise us to Him to live forever. Let's pray this right now and every day this week: Jesus, help me to realize that You are alive, and every time I receive You, that You are alive in me. This week, as we celebrate Easter, make a practice that was common after the resurrection with the early Christians to say to family members and friends, "Jesus Christ is risen; He is alive!"

Stewardship Bulletin Reflection April 20, 2025 - Easter Sunday, The Resurrection of the Lord ACTS 10:34A, 37-43; PS 118:1-2, 16-17, 22-23; COL 3:1-4 or 1 COR 5:6B-8; JN 20:1-9 He is risen! Risen indeed! His Resurrection is not just a past event

we commemorate but a living reality that brings hope and transformation. Jesus, crucified for our sins, rose from the dead, conquering death once and for all. As we gather on this Easter Sunday, let's not just acknowledge the Resurrection as a historical fact, but let's feel its truth in our hearts. Do we live as witnesses to the glorious reality of the Resurrection in our daily lives? Of course, a witness has first-hand knowledge. Our readings today focus on the Resurrection itself and those who witnessed it. In the Gospel, St. John describes the very first witnesses to the empty tomb: Mary Magdalene, John ("the disciple whom Jesus loved"), and Peter. Each had an individual "experience" of the empty tomb and went up close to see what Jesus' love had accomplished. How can we, as Christian stewards all these years later, see for ourselves and become His witnesses? We "see for ourselves" when we prayerfully read the Scriptures, knowing they are a living love letter from God with a message to each of us. We "see for ourselves" each time we receive our Lord's precious Body and Blood in the Eucharist. We "see for ourselves" when we experience His personal and healing power in our hearts during Reconciliation. We "see for ourselves" when we pour out our lives in loving service to those around us and experience the deep satisfaction that only comes when we imitate our Savior. This Easter, resolve to live as if the saving power of the Resurrection is true. Experience Jesus for yourself every day from now on. You will be a powerful witness to the truth that He is risen! He is indeed risen!
