#### A brief note about the Presenter, Sr. Lourthu Mary FMM

St. Mary's, Lyndon Station, is honored to welcome **Sr. Lourthu Mary FMM**, a member of the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary, from Chennai, Tamil Nadu, India who will be giving a talk on 'Last Seven words of Jesus' for our parishioners. Sr. Lourthu Mary will be sharing her wisdom, spiritual insights, and deep faith with all who attend. Her presentation will be an enriching experience, drawing from her rich academic background and extensive international experience.

Sr. Lourthu Mary's journey of service to God and society spans across education, social development, and spiritual growth. With qualifications that include a B. Com, M.A., M.Phil., U.G.C. – NET, and a Ph.D., she has served as an Associate Professor at Stella Maris College in Chennai, Tamil Nadu since 2002, where she also held leadership roles as Head of the Department for MSW and HRM and Dean of Academic Affairs.

Her influence extends far beyond the classroom. Her global outreach has taken her to countries like Nepal, Germany, Columbia, the USA, and the Philippines, where she has shared her expertise in social justice, youth welfare, and community empowerment. But above all, her deep love for the Word of God, social inclusion, and belief in equity guide her in all her endeavors.

#### A few reasons behind Coving the Statues during this time of the year

Statues in churches are traditionally covered during Holy Week, especially from the 5th Sunday of Lent until Easter as a sign of mourning and to help the faithful focus more deeply on the sorrow and suffering of Christ. Here's a breakdown of the reasons:

- 1. Visual Fasting: Just like we fast from food, covering images is a kind of "visual fasting." It removes distractions and helps people enter more deeply into the solemn and reflective mood of Holy Week.
- **2. Anticipation of the Resurrection:** The veiling adds to the drama and anticipation. When the statues and crucifixes are uncovered at Easter, it becomes a powerful visual sign of the resurrection and the return of joy.
- **3. Highlighting Christ's Humility:** During his Passion, Christ hid his divinity in a way. Covering sacred images symbolizes that "hiddenness" and helps us meditate on his suffering and self-emptying.

Traditionally, veils are purple, the liturgical color for Lent, representing penance and mourning.

(Reminder) Chrism Mass | April 15, 2025 | Cathedral of St. Joseph the Workman, La Crosse | The Chrism Mass is one of the diocesan highlights at which the Bishop blesses the oils for the celebration of the Sacraments of Baptism and the Anointing of the Sick, and consecrates the Sacred Chrism used in the Sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Orders. Priests also renew their priestly promises at this Mass, and the faithful pray for them. The Chrism Mass will be celebrated on Tuesday, April 15, at 10:30 a.m., at St. Joseph the Workman Cathedral in La Crosse. Please consider attending!

A Minute with Jesus: Jesus is the "living Bread from Heaven." | Jesus said, "I am the living bread that came down from Heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever." (John 6:51). Jesus gave this living bread for the first time to His apostles at the Last Supper. Jesus gives this living bread to us in holy Communion. The living bread is Jesus Himself. Let's pray this right now and every day this week: Jesus, please strengthen my faith to believe that You are the "living bread" received in holy Communion. This week, read the explanation that Jesus gives that He is the "living Bread from Heaven" in John 6: 48-51

Lent: Reclaim your thoughts | You are invited to find and read a compelling Catholic book because reading good books is part of our ongoing search for truth, and we know that Jesus Christ is the truth. Further, reading is essential to help us think clearly and logically. Stewardship Bulletin Reflection April 6, 2025 - Fifth Sunday of Lent EZ 37:12-14; PS 130:1-2, 3-4, 5-6, 7-8; ROM 8:8-11; JN 11:25A, 26; JN 11:1-45; JN 11:3-7, 17, 20-27,

33B-45 Once again, this week, we are reminded of the unfailing love and boundless mercy of the God we serve. The theme of the readings for this fifth Sunday of Lent Luke beautifully encapsulates the unfailing love and boundless mercy of God as he tells the story of the woman caught in adultery. In the face of those who would have stoned her, Christ says, "Neither do I condemn you. Go, and from now on, do not sin anymore." This statement is a powerful reminder of God's love and mercy, which we can always rely on. When we turn to God for forgiveness, He is gracious, merciful, and transformative. His forgiveness is not just a wiping away of our sins but a complete renewal, making us new creations in Christ. This renewal is a source of great hope and encouragement for us all. What is more impressive is that this all-perfect and holy God of ours draws so very near to us. Our sins do not drive Him from us but instead to us so He can set us free. Look carefully at Christ's actions and posture in the Gospel reading as He deals with both the crowd of people, the Scribes and Pharisees, and the adulterous woman. "All the people started coming to Him, and he sat down and taught them." "He bent down and began to write with His finger." He "straightened up" when confronting the Scribes and Pharisees about their sins. And he "straightened up" when He assured the woman that He did not condemn her for her past. Like a skilled teacher or loving big brother," Christ bends down to where we are; He sits among us, He stands to confront us when needed, and He stands to look us in the eye to remind us of our true dignity. While we may feel unworthy of the great privilege of serving Him, this is not a cause for despair but rather a reason for greater joy. Let us serve Him with all our hearts, knowing that our service brings Him joy and fulfillment.


