# **Memorial Day and Easter Season**

Memorial Day offers a profound opportunity to reflect on themes that resonate deeply with the Easter season - sacrifice, remembrance, and the hope that emerges from loss.

**Both observances center on the ultimate sacrifice made for others**. Just as Easter commemorates Christ's sacrifice for humanity's redemption, Memorial Day honors those who gave their lives for our freedom and values. In both cases, we remember that the greatest love is shown when someone lays down their life for others.

The Easter season speaks to transformation - death giving way to new life, darkness yielding to light, despair becoming hope. Similarly, Memorial Day reminds us that from the tragedy of war and loss comes the preservation of liberty, democracy, and the chance for future generations to live in freedom. The fallen are not truly gone when their sacrifice continues to bear fruit in the lives, we're able to live.

**Both seasons call us to remembrance** - not just as a backward glance, but as a forward commitment. Easter calls Christians to live worthy of the sacrifice made for them. Memorial Day calls all Americans to live worthy of the sacrifice made by those who died for our country. In both cases, remembrance becomes responsibility.

The hope of Easter - that death is not the final word, that love ultimately triumphs - echoes in our Memorial Day observance. We gather not in despair but in gratitude, believing that those who died in service to others have participated in something eternal and meaningful. Their sacrifice becomes part of a larger story of redemption and hope.

As we honor our fallen heroes this Memorial Day, we can draw strength from the Easter message that sacrificial love has the power to transform the world, and that those who give their lives for others join in something sacred that transcends death itself.



Stewardship Bulletin Reflection May 25, 2025 - Sixth Sunday of Easter ACTS 15:1-2, 22 -29; PS 67: 2-3, 5, 6, 8; REV 21:10-14, 22-23; JN 14:23-29 The concept of hospitality, which is warm and inclusive, is fundamental to a stewardship way of life. When we envision hospitality, we naturally think of offering newcomers in our parish a sincere and warm welcome. We picture inviting them in and helping them feel at home and at ease in our presence, conveying that they are highly valued. Today's Gospel reading from John invites us to consider hospitality in a slightly different light. In it, we hear Jesus saying this to his disciples: "Whoever loves me will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our dwelling with him." This passage is not just about love and obedience; it also reflects the hospitality of the heart, inviting God to dwell within us. Jesus invites us to welcome the Blessed Trinity to dwell within us. This extraordinary request reminds us that our highest and most cherished form of hospitality should be directed toward God Himself. How does one show hospitality to God? How do we make God "at home and ease" within us? How can we communicate to God that He is "highly valued" by us? Jesus tells us how: We are to keep His word and follow His teachings. We must know His word to keep it. This requires discipline and effort. We must prioritize studying Scripture and Church teachings in our daily lives; through this study, we gain a deeper understanding of God's word and His teachings, which inspire and motivate us to live lives of stewardship. If we want our parish to be a place of genuine Christian hospitality, we must ensure that our hearts are hospitable dwelling places for the Blessed Trinity. Then our smiles, words, greetings, and ministries—each an integral part of our parish community—will radiate with the warmth of God's love. This way, our parish family will become something like Heaven on Earth, and we will all share this larger purpose. This embodies the simplicity and glory of a stewardship way of life.
